


#### **STAMPS**

#### Each year Lions have a National March-May Membership Campaign across Australia to help raise awareness of Lions and increase membership.

In Tasmania we are asking clubs to have activities from February – May to capitalise on the good weather when most of the public are out and about.

This year District is asking if each club could purchase 50 balloons (1 balloon for each club in our district) to fly when they have their activity, to attract the attention of the passing public.

These balloons can be purchased from myself at a cost of *\$12.87 for 50.* They are gold with the Lions logo on them.

Suggested activities could be sausage sizzle, family fun day in a park with games for children and running races for adults and children, or any other activity that is social and would attract people. Clubs can also seize the opportunity at an already planned community activity which they are holding to fly our balloons, and show the public we are having fun.

### Australian Lionsonoz in Action



Australian Lionsonoz Club member, Lion John Matheson lives in an over 50's Lifestyle Resort in the suburb of Eagleby, Brisbane, which has about 660 residents. This year he has sold 40 x 1.5kg cakes and 15 x 900gm puddings, which he delivered to the residents. He had put an order sheet up in both club houses for the cakes and puddings for about six weeks prior to delivery, letting the residents know when he would be delivering them.

As the Australian Lionsonoz Club does not have any fundraising facilities, Lion John sells the Lions Christmas Cakes and Puddings on behalf of the Lions Club of Ormeau Inc., which is close to where he lives.

Lion John's "profit" is the hours he can claim, assisting a main stream Lions Club. Next year he is going to try something different if the Craft Ladies will let him.

Around the end of November each year the village Ladies Craft Group have an annual market day where all groups within the village can sell anything that they make, nothing can be brought in that is not made in the village and there are some very talented people living in there, from woodwork, painting, sewing, quilting, card making, jewellery etc. He is going to ask them if they can forego the cost of having a stall, and bringing goods in that are not made here, so that he can sell the cakes and puddings, it is assumed he could increase his sales by a fair amount by doing this.

#### Dear fellow Lions of District 201T1

At the recent 201T1 District Convention those that attended heard PDG Bill Duncanson from Victoria deliver an address about a new piece of equipment for use to assist with the Lions Eye Health Program. It is known as the Welch-Alynn Spot Vision Scanner, an instrument the size of a commercial digital camera that can be used to assess vision problem from children as young as 6 months to those of us in the aging bracket with a 98.5% accuracy. In this day and age, we have to keep in front as technology makes our work easier at some cost unfortunately.

There has already been a number of Lions Clubs who have indicated interest in the piece of equipment, especially in the North, and I have had an enquiry from a Southern Region club. Read more about this subject later in this article.

The Zone Chair people have been asked to distribute the **"LEHP Emergency Guest Speaker Kits"** to the clubs indicated in their area of responsibility, whilst doing so, ask that they support this MD 201 Project . If your club hasn't received the kit by the end of February, contact your Zone Chairman please.

**Lion Robyn Desmond:** Spring Bay, Bicheno, Glamorgan. I will have these packs ready for you at the next District Cabinet Meeting Sunday 12<sup>th</sup> February 2017.

There were some negative thoughts getting around about the viability of the Spot Screening device due to its cost. This has come about due to the red tape involved in accessing the State Public School system with all the restrictions that are in place. This is not unique to Tasmania, as other states are experiencing the same problems.

However we need not start there. The early learning facilities that are almost in every city and town in Tasmania where the operator does not need to personally handle children or be alone with them. However, a certificate for **"Working with Children"** is encouraged and is available from Service Tasmania and may be paid for from Club Activities funds. Carers or parents are encouraged to be there with them. Those of us at the other end of the spectrum don't have that problem.

At this point may I suggest that if enough clubs show interest in the Regions, pool your resources and perhaps apply to the TLF for a grant to cover the balance? I will personally raise this subject at the TLF Meeting in March. Ultimately I would love to see three in our district. There is no rush as they will be demonstrated at the MD201 Convention in Hobart by LEHP Committee members in May this year. See you there.

I will be in Melbourne for the semi-annual meeting of the Multiple District Committee of the Lions Eye Health Programs 1 & 2<sup>nd</sup> March, more news to follow in the District Newsletter.

Touchstone Story #44 Making A Mark

The earliest civilizations left behind clues that revealed what mattered to them, in the form of artifacts or buildings that have stood the test of time: pyramids rising from desert sands, or stone monoliths in grassy English fields.

<u>Often, the first thing people see when visiting a</u> <u>community is the familiar Lions Clubs Internation-</u> <u>al logo.</u> The logo represents a promise of service and a commitment to community. It is perhaps the most familiar marker associated with Lions Clubs International, but it is far from the only one.

Lions Clubs Friendship Arches, designed by Past International Directors Howard Grimm and Vern France, are monuments to friendship between neighboring nations. Made of stone and built to last, the first Friendship Arch was erected in 1966 on the U.S.-Canada border by the Abbotsford Lions Club of British Columbia, Canada and the Sumas Lions Club of Washington. Many Friendship Arches were erected in the 1960s as symbols of peace and hope in the midst of the Cold War. In 1967, a Friendship Arch was sent overseas and placed on the border between Germany and Belgium. The dedication was attended by Lions from Germany, Belgium and the United States. Dr. Albert Soenen of the Sint-Truiden Lions Club in Belgium, remarked that Sint-Truiden itself was a crossroads for Europe, and that the Friendship Arch was "at the crossing point from London to Vienna, and from Paris to Bonn, uniting four Western European nations—England, France, Belgium and Germany. <u>Perhaps the time has come for Lions to consider</u> *placing arches in places where 'Bridges of Friendship,'* <u>and the conversations that they inspire, are so sorely</u> <u>needed."</u>

Lions also erect memorials to those among their ranks. When Ray Evans, a member of the Shawnee Lions Club of Oklahoma, was killed by a hitchhiker in 1936, the Lions erected a simple roadside stone monument in his honor. In 1963, to honor the memory of all those who had gone before, Lions from 38 clubs in Rhode Island worked together to raise funds for a stone statue of to honor Rhode Island's deceased Lions. <u>Lions</u> <u>Clubs International founder Melvin Jones is memorialized both at his place of birth—an official historic site in Fort Thomas, Arizona—and for his service to others, with a display of memorabilia at the Lions <u>Clubs International headquarters in Oak Brook, Illinois.</u></u>

Driving into town and being greeted by a familiar leonine face on a sign, or strolling past a stone arch dedicated to friendship across international boundary lines sends a signal of comfort and service to all who see them.

After many months of twoing and froing, most of which was devoted to securing funding, the Mosaic Project is underway. The project, to renovate and enhance a recreational area and to establish a disabled access garden on an abandoned garden plot, is at Mosaic Services at Rokeby, The project, beyond the financial capacity of the Club, has been guaranteed with funding for the renovation and the basic garden construction granted from the Tasmanian Community Fund and the completion of the disabled access garden through a grant from the Stronger Communities fund. The initial work undertaken at the first working bees has been to prepare the area by removing existing paving and trees to allow for the laying of a concrete slab and clearing the surrounding area of trees and other obstructions. When the construction phase of the project is complete, the ongoing garden project will involve students from the Rokeby High School working with the disabled in the garden. **PDG Robin Pulford**

#### Membership Director/Chairperson

The membership director is the chairperson of the membership committee. His/her responsibilities include:

• Development of a club membership growth program and

presenting the program to the board of directors for approval

• Regular encouragement at club meetings of recruiting new quality members

• Ensuring implementation of proper recruitment and retention procedures

• Preparing and implementing member orientation sessions

• Reporting to the board of directors on ways to reduce the loss of members

• Coordinating with other club committees in fulfilling these responsibilities

• Serving as a member of the zone level membership committee

#### Secretary

He/she is under the supervision and direction of the president and the board of directors, and is the liaison officer between the club and the district (single or sub and multiple) in which the club is located, and the association. The secretary:

- Submits regular monthly membership reports, activities reports and other reports specified by the association
- Submits upon request reports to the district governor's cabinet including copies of monthly membership and activities reports
- Cooperates with and serves as an active member of the district governor's advisory committee of the zone in which the club is located

#### Secretary continued

- Has custody of and maintains general records of the club, including minutes of club and board meetings; attendance; committee appointments; elections; member information, addresses and telephone numbers of members; members club accounts
- Arranges for issuance, in cooperation with the treasurer, of quarterly or semi-annual statements to each member for dues and other financial obligations owed to the club, collects and turns dues over to the club treasurer and obtains a receipt
- Gives bond for the faithful discharge of his/her office in the sum and with surety as determined by the board of directors

#### Treasurer

He/she shall:

- Receive all monies from the secretary and deposit the currency in a bank or banks recommended by the finance committee and approved by the board of directors
- Pay the club's obligations, as authorized by the board of directors. All checks and vouchers shall be signed by the treasurer and countersigned by one other officer, determined by the board of directors
- Have custody of and maintain general records of club receipts and disbursements
- Prepare and submit monthly and semi-annual financial reports to the international office of the association and the board of directors of this club ©Give bond for the faithful discharge of his/her office in the sum and with surety as determined by the board of directors
