What is club morale like, and what would the average age of your club be.


What are you keen to keep and build on, and what

A series of Lions Policy and Procedure instructions and reminders for all Lions leaders from GLT Coordinator PDG Rob Mantach will feature each month.

This appeared on social media this week. How true it is for many of our clubs. If we want our club to survive we all have to work on its survival. Don't be the member that just sits back and letting others do it.

Activities or Administration?

The question is often asked 'can we use activity funds for administrative purposes?' And the answer is always 'No.'

Every club needs to operate at least two bank accounts – Activities and Administration, plus other accounts such as an operating account or an investment account. What funds go into or out of each account is very clear.

Funds raised from the public must go into the activity account. These funds are considered as public money and cannot be expended for administrative purposes. However, the expenses for a public fund raiser need to be drawn from the proceeds prior to the deposit. Such expenses would be cost of goods sold, hire of venue or equipment, etc. Labour costs for Lions volunteering at the event is definitely not a viable expense.

Extract for the Use of Funds Policy:

Direct Expenses of Fundraiser. Direct expenses of a public fundraiser may be deducted from the proceeds of the fundraiser to replenish the administrative funds used to hold the fundraiser.

Lions Clubs are able to contract out their services for payment by another body, eg. Selling entry tickets for an event where the other body is receiving the entry fees, mowing the lawns for the local council, fruit picking for an orchard or vineyard. In these instances the Lions should not be wearing their uniform or have advertising promoting Lions.

The main principle is that Lions members cannot personally benefit from funds raised from the public. The 'Use of Funds Policy' and the 'Use of Funds Guidelines" available on the LCI website provides clear information on how to separate funds received.

This means that member's dues cannot be paid from the Activities account. Many clubs subsidise member's dues but the subsidy must come from the administration account.

Dear Presidents, Secretaries and Club Cake Chairpersons

Welcome to another Lion's year. The Lions Christmas Cake and Pudding season is once again fast approaching, although conditions are a little different from last year. This will also be the second season we sell Traditional Foods' cakes and puddings. Please get your orders in early.

I have listed below some important information and dates for you:

Order Discount Period – 1 July 2023 to 31 October 2023

Orders must be <u>delivered and paid</u> for during this period to receive the order discount. The last date an order can be placed is the **16 October 2023** to allow order processing and delivery before the **31 October 2023**. There are no exceptions to this rule.

Orders on Account – 1st July 2023 to 31st December 2023.

Orders placed during this period without payment must be paid in full by the <u>25 January 2024</u>. There are no exceptions to this rule. Clubs will receive an invoice via email approximately three weeks after order placement. Invoices are sent to the <u>email address as listed on the order form at the time of order placement</u>. A Club **meeting is not required to approve payment** as the Club has already approved payment and entered a credit agreement at the time of placing the order. Please bring this to the attention of your Club Treasurer. <u>Order cut</u> <u>-off date for delivery before Christmas</u> is <u>Friday 8 December 2023</u>.

Order forms are two sided. Please read the instructions on the form carefully. Also, <u>orders should not be</u> handwritten.

- ◆ TO PROVIDE a forum for the open discussion of all matters of public interest; provided, however, that partisan politics and sectarian religion shall not be debated by club members.
- ◆ TO ENCOURAGE service-minded people to serve their community without personal financial reward, and to encourage efficiency and promote high ethical standards in commerce, industry, professions, public works and private endeavours.

Lions Eye Health Program

The situation with Children's Vision Screening in Tasmania is changing rapidly. Over 1100 children have now been screened across Tasmania. We now have 53 fully qualified screeners, including seven qualified facilitators and three qualified trainers. Twenty four clubs across the state have at least one qualified screener or screener in training.

We will have the equipment necessary to provide vision screening across the state. What we don't have is enough screeners and clubs taking up the challenge. There is no reason your club can not get involved and get your members trained up to do vision screening.

We do screening, not diagnosis. We advise the parents to take their child to a qualified optometrist to properly diagnose a child's vision problems.

More Vision Screening training will be happening on Saturday 5th August.

The venue is at The Rock Community Church, 2 Dooley Street, Penguin, 7016.

There will be a brief information session, followed by the training.

It will start promptly at 9.30 am and should finish by noon.

If needed we may extend the training to 12.30pm. Morning tea/coffee and biscuits will be provided, but no lunch. There is plenty of free parking available at the rear of the building.
