 THIS IS NOT A GENERAL POLICY COVERING LIONS!
 It is specifically limited to the District Governor team.

If a club wishes to purchase a policy, (and it is very worthwhile), they should contact PDG Bob Korotcoff for details.

Would you please note this important correction as regards your club as it would be very upsetting to a member if they have an accident, believing they were covered.

THE CLUB'S PUBLIC OFFICER DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

All Lions Clubs in District 201T1 (Tasmania) are incorporated under the provisions of the Associations Incorporation Act 1964 (Tas). Once a Club is incorporated it becomes "A body corporate with perpetual succession and a common seal".

This means the Club becomes a separate legal entity which can own assets, conduct business activities and sue and be sued in its own name. Another benefit of incorporation is that – subject to some exceptions – the members of the Club have limited legal liability.

Each club must appoint a Public Officer who acts as the Club contact person for all of its legal activities and who should also be the custodian of the Club's seal.

From a practical point of view the main, and most of the time the only role of the Public Officer is to ensure that the Club's financial affairs are audited "as soon as practical' after the end of the Club's financial year and then liaise with the Club's auditor to facilitate the filing of the Club's annual return. This must be done within six months of the Club's Annual General Meeting.

The Public Officer must also advise corporate affairs of any changes to the Club's constitution which must be registered with Corporate Affairs within one month to have legal effect.

Corporate Affairs holds details of the Public Officers annual returns and constitutions all associations incorporated under the act. These details are available from Corporate Affairs on the payment of a small fee.

The Public Officer can stay in that position indefinitely or be replaced as determined by the Club. A new Public Officer must notify Corporate Affairs of the appointment within 14 days.

It needs to be noted that there are penalties for breaches of the Act. It follows that the Club's Public Officer would be wise to be familiar with the provisions of the Act which can be easily found on line.

An extended role for the Public Officer could/should be the custodian of the Club's constitution and any Policy minutes or by laws. If the Public Officer is an experienced Lion then he/she could be an advisor to the Club Board on legal and constitutional matters.

Theme for 2016 " A Celebration of Peace"

Students who will be 11, 12 or 13 years of age on November 15th 2016, are eligible to participate. Through the contest students are encouraged to visually depict their interpretation of the contest's theme.

Peace Poster kits are now available from
National Office after a delay in dispatch
and can only be ordered online from
National Office Club Supplies at
www.lionsclubshop.com.au
using the same procedure as when
their Club orders any materials from
Club Supplies.

The Clubs also need to be reminded that the Lions Club Member placing the order will need to have their Club banking details they can't order the Kits without authorizing.

Each school your sponsors must have their own PP Kit with the original certificates etc. to distribute,The Rules state "a Peace Poster Kit must be purchased for each contest sponsored". (See "Getting Started for Club Use")

Therefore, ten (10) PP Kits purchased = 10 winning Posters, one from each Kit sponsored, to be sent to the District Governor for the District Judging...

"Contest Judging" (PPC-2 EN) "Only one poster can be selected per contest sponsored, (i.e. PP Kit) to advance to the next level of judging".

Explanation:

In the Peace Poster Kits, there are two (2) certificates.

- 1. Certificate of Appreciation: is usually given to the school who participated. Cannot be copied.
- **2.** Achievement Award: is given to the student from that school who was the winner. Cannot be copied.
- 3. Winner Sticker: The Rules state a "reproduction of the sticker are not permitted" (See "Forward Winning Poster to next level of judging" PPC 4). This is to be attached on the back lower right-hand corner of the winning poster from that school.

An information sheet (PPC -3) can be

completed by the Lions Club and distributed to the student's family...

This can be completed then copied for each child participating in that school only.

Lioness Clubs: It is great to see the Lioness Clubs are taking an interest in the Peace Poster Contest.

We are delighted that they are participating, however, unless the sponsoring Lions Club sponsors the contest it cannot be accepted for judging at any level.

The Contest Rules and Conditions clearly state..."A Lioness Club can sponsor the contest through its sponsoring Lions Club"

Whilst the Lioness Club can seek out the schools/contestants, the "Winner Sticker" would need to show the sponsoring Lions Club details. What they write on the certificates is up to the Clubs concerned...

In the past two years, a District Governor has chosen a poster from a Lioness Club as the District Winning poster.

Unfortunately the posters needed to be disqualified from the National Judging.

However, no Club should put forward a poster to the next level of judging, unless all the areas of the "Winner Sticker" are completed correctly, especially club information.

We do want your Lioness Clubs them to participate in the Contest, but we must also follow the rules, because it is no use MD paying all the costs involved to send a poster to LCI, we know will be disqualified once it reaches LCI, if all the Contest Conditions are not followed.

All district posters will be on display at the MD Convention in Echuca, then returned to the student by either the DG, PP District Chair or Club PP Chair. Please arrange for one of these to collect your poster from the Convention Peace Poster Stand.

A Celebration of Peace Essay competition

This essay contest was created to offer an opportunity to visually impaired young people to express their feelings of peace. In this context visually impaired is more than simply needing glasses though an exact definition is hard to come by, a good guide would be the issue of limited vision being included in special educational needs provision.

Award Tops Off Huge 2015

As part of the Australia Day celebrations, the central Coast Council awarded the Ulverstone Lions Club the Community Event of the Year award for their 50th Anniversary celebrations.

On May 25th 2015, Ulverstone Lions Club celebrated 50 year since charter, the club was formed in 1965, with their Charter dinner being held on the September 25th 1965.

The club still has one active Charter member, Lion Max Johnston.

We also have one member Lion Rex Smith, whilst not recorded as a charter member was inducted into the club in 1965.

To celebrate this milestone the club held a dinner at the Ulverstone Rowing Club and invited all current and past members of the club, as well as dignitaries of the Ulverstone Community and Lions Tasmania. 105 Lions and Guests gathered to celebrate 50 years of service, fellowship and achievement by the club in the Ulverstone Community. The club has always maintained a strong membership of 40-50 members with diverse projects that enables all members to be involved in something or everything



As a contribution to the community the club also undertook to construct a Memorial Wall which would display the names of all Australia Day Citizens of the Year, Young Citizens of the Year, Community Events of the Year and presiding Mayors of Ulverstone / Central Coast since the awards began in 1981. The Wall was unveiled the day after our celebration dinner and was well attended and received positive affirmation from past award recipients and their families.

The irony is that the club will have their name placed on the wall, for the project of building it!!

Whilst these activities dominated the first half of 2015, the club continued on with projects both small and large that epitomized the work that Lions does in the community.

Lift for Lilly: This was a community driven project to raise funds to purchase a vehicle with a lift, that would enable a family with a wheelchair confined child (Lilly) and her disabled sister to travel without having to be lifted in and out of vehicles. The club contributed \$8,000 towards the purchase of a second hand vehicle and \$1,200 towards garage modifications.



Proceeds of our Charity Golf Day, \$3,000, was donated to Motor Neurone Tasmania in memory of Life member Robbie Johnstone who passed away in January from the disease. This organization was also one of PDG George Bugeja's projects during his term as DG.

We partnered with Port Sorell Lions Club to assist a family with a young boy suffering from Muscular Dystrophy, the club provided \$2,000 towards home modifications and an electric bed which the club had purchased and was no longer required by the original recipient.

We held sausage sizzles to the accompaniment of local Country Music artists to raise \$1,500 for the Flying Doctors.

Greetings fellow Lions

Been a busy three months hasn't it with the Christmas/New Year festivities out of the road, and time to now devout to projects with in our Lions Clubs.

The Rocky Cape Lions Club ran a successful Health & Wellbeing Expo last month, but unfortunately the Mawbanna bushfire took centre stage with smoke and ash dropping all around the venue. However, the people from the area are a hardly lot and turned out to support it, and the market day in the grounds of the Rocky Cape Tavern.

Your "Ambassadors" from our North West set up and were happy to speak to all who got anywhere close to us. Thank you to IPDG Michael MacLaren, Lions Stuart McNeair, Anne Fagg, and that Roving Lion who helps out where ever he is Lion Max Tavasci. Thank you all for helping me.

The intention was to promote Eye health issues with pre-school children as well as children of primary school age. These young people who may have sight problems accept the fact that what they see, is what the rest of us see. So the message is clear. Have you child's sight checked before starting school.

The National MD Committee met in Melbourne 25th & 26th of February and the organizational changes to the "N" and "Q" districts now means better representation making to positions of the Co-ordinators much easier to cope with.

There is a strong emphasis being placed on the Children's program, followed by those that related to adults as in the past. A new Presentation with "Voice over commentary" will be available after the Echuca MD Convention. This allows for all our Ambassadors to pass on the same message Australia wide at speaking engagements. There are other shorter versions in the pipe line.

Zone Chairpersons, remember we are available for your Zone meetings, group Zone meetings/ dinners all any of us needs is the invitation.

During the past ten years, Lions Recycle for Sight Australia has collected close to 4 million pair of spectacles thanks to an Australia Post Reply Paid Facility, 1,000 Lions/Lioness Clubs in Australia and several hundred clubs in Japan.

The Centre has shipped close to 3.5 million

pair throughout the world, including several countries in Africa, the Middle East, India and Pakistan, Sri Lanka, Bangladesh, Nepal, Kurdystan and Moldova in Europe, most countries in Asia including Papua New Guinea, Timor Leste, Philippines, China, American Samoa, Vanuatu, Solomon Islands, Fiji, Vietnam, Laos and Afghanistan as well as the smallest islands in the Indonesian Archipelago Pacific.

The Lions Recycle For Sight Australia programme operates throughout Australia, in Japan and in Malaysia. There are five locations. Two are manned by Lions supervisors and three are self-managed in correctional institutions. Now there is a Special Schools Centre in Maryborough Queensland. At all of these centres, recycling and training are prime functions. Persons who have transgressed the law are trained to process the spectacles, providing them with skills and work ethics to help their rehabilitation back into contemporary society.

In addition to the process of sorting, grading and packaging boxes of 250 pair of spectacles and sunglasses, the Centre has installed lens making equipment in one, and soon three locations, to augment their capacity to service the needs of the Third World.

Recently the programme added a sponsorship with an on-line prescription maker to provide one free pair of spectacles for every pair sold on line - estimated at 5,000 pair of new spectacles in a year. Currently the programme receives 500,000 pair annually from Australia and Japan, and it refurbishes and distributes about the same number to groups around the world.

They had been previously counted by Lion Amanda Gwalter. The stamps had been collected from the public, Tafe New England and as well as this, many places that have big mail rooms had also been harassed.

As the Club President Lion Anne Sanders was aware that Lion Warren would be visiting South West Rocks in a couple of weeks' time and would be delivering used spectacles and other used postage stamps to the South West Rocks Lions Club it was an ideal opportunity to be able to transport the stamps there safely. South West Rocks Lions Club have been for many years the outlet for these recycled items collected in District 201N1

Lion Warren had another reason to be visiting Tamworth Peel Valley Lions Club. He is in the process of introducing a new member to that Club.

Long Walk for Leukodystrophy

The Walker - John Olsen

John Olsen, a 30+ year member of Lions and a member for the past 5 years of the Lions Club of Geelong Corio Bay, is about to embark on a monumental Trans-Australian walk.

John is planning to walk diagonally across Australia from Cape York to Cape Leeuwin. He anticipates that it will take him a little over five months

John's self-motivated task is certainly a huge one but it should be noted that he has already done two transcontinental walks; the first, in 2004, north to south from Cape York, Queensland to South West Cape, Tasmania and the second, in 2008, west to east from Steep Point, Western Australia, to Byron Bay, New Sout5h Wales, (and then home the 1,800 km. to Geelong on foot).

We believe that there is a fair chance that John will be the first to complete the diagonal crossing of Australia on foot.



John's Motivation

John's first walk was simply about John setting a task for himself and then putting himself to the test. It became a fundraiser as he progressed when people he met along the way insisted on giving him charitable donations. In the end it became a substantial fundraiser for the Australian Lions Children's Mobility Foundation.

His second walk was also about setting a task for himself but on this occasion he focused on two specific charities, namely, the Australian Lions Children's Mobility Foundation and Australian Leukodystrophy Support Group.

This third walk is also about John setting personal goals but the primary purpose of this walk is to raise funds for Leukodystrophy Australia (previously the Australian Leukodystrophy Support Group). John's partner, Vida, died of the condition early in 2014. As the condition largely affects the mobility of children, there are some common goals with our own ALCMF.

There are a range of leukodystrophies and more detailed information on the condition can be found via any internet search engine. *However, a brief, layman's description of the condition follows*

Leukodystrophies

Leukodystrophies are a group of degenerative genetic diseases that affect the nervous system. They most often take hold during childhood with many losing the ability to see, hear, walk, sit up or even swallow. There is no cure for leukodystrophy and the impact on families is devastating.

In general, in new born babies the myelin sheaf, which protects the nerves, is not fully developed but normally development is complete within a few years. Sometimes the development is delayed, but without, necessarily, any further disruption to the child's development.

However, for some children, the sheaf never completes development and this leads to a range of disorders caused by degeneration of the white matter in the brain. Leukodystrophies are characterized by specific symptoms including decreased motor function, muscle rigidity, and eventually degeneration of sight and hearing.

The onset of the disease in adults leads to similar symptoms. There is no cure for the disease and it is a fatal condition. However, there are treatments which slow down the progress of the disease and the results of recent research provides some hope for a cure in the long term. For instance, recent limited success in repairing spinal cord injuries provides some hope.

The Walk

John plans to set out in late March or early April. Based on his past walks, he estimates that he will cover about 1000 km. each month, taking just over 6 months to complete the 5,500 km. walk. John refuses to use a support vehicle and relies on picking up food, water and other essentials along the way.

He pulls a purpose built, two wheel cart, which he fondly refers to as 'Wilson', and makes camp along the way as he sees fit.

John's planned route takes him south from Cape York, cutting across to Normanton, and then in a relatively straight line through to Camooweal. From there he will head south west to Alice Springs, and then make his way to Uluru before heading off along the Great Central Road to Laverton. The next stage will take him to Kalgoorlie, westward towards Perth before turning south west again through Wave Rock and finally onto Cape Leeuwin. He then plans to complete his walk by walking north to Perth.

Involvement of Lions Clubs

This is an official project of the Lions Club of Geelong Corio Bay but not an official Lions Australia project but it should be noted that it has the capacity to generate considerable positive publicity for Lions in general.

The majority of Lions Clubs do not, of course, lie along John's route. We are not asking clubs to necessarily donate to the cause but we would, on behalf of Leukodystrophy Australia, gladly accept any donation that clubs might wish to provide. A future Information Sheet will provide the necessary details.

It should be noted that John is adamant that 100% of all donations will go to the charity and you can rest assured that that is exactly what will happen. He will fund the expenses of his walk from sponsorships and personal savings.

For the limited number of Lions Clubs along John's route we will, in a future Information Sheet, ask them to consider providing John with any appropriate support and publicity. John would also make himself available
