I penned that slogan to remind me and members in the District that if we are to distinguish ourselves as Lions and carry on the strong traditions of our predecessors we simply, need to get things done.

With any organisation or group there is always lots of talk. You have no doubt heard the saying "talk is cheap". Some Lions can attend meetings and get momentarily revved up about this or that idea/suggestion and forget about the whole thing by the time they get to their car to return home. To me that is unacceptable participation and poor self-leadership. It is the same noise a hollow bell makes... Nothing.

I am sure some people are intimidated by the thought of being in a leadership role. The nightly news is constantly reporting political upheaval and other world discords, making the thought of world peace a comedian's punch line. The idea of entering the world of leadership would scare off most, but leadership is more than just tackling problems of the Lions world, it's also about achievement and satisfaction.

I would offer, that it is decisiveness in handling Lions day-to-day issues with civility, patience, and an effort at understanding, that lays the groundwork and generates momentum for one to consider taking on some higher office and achievements.

Leadership qualities for Lions would include - selfless service, charitable acts, and any personal example with whom you interact with daily, being other option(s) and easier or more obvious pathways to consider leadership.

I am requesting that all Lions Clubs in the District dedicate one of their meeting nights (or days) in April-May to conduct a membership recruitment drive. Possible suggestions on the structure of this event are fluid, with ideas ranging from something simpleto a more formal approach. The important point is to plan something that will help your club reach a larger audience and get more projects up and running. Where does one begin? Start by setting a date. Planning the

activities and publicising your event are must do's. Suggest to brainstorm a list of prospective members, and contact them. RSVP'S should be encouraged.

"Libraries are the future of Lions Clubs.

Today I attended two separate lions Clubs meetings in two separate Libraries in Delaware.

Why? The majority of the membership of each of the two clubs are under the age of 50 and are still working full time jobs, so meeting on the weekend

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works best for their membership.

Each of the clubs met for free in a community room that the libraries had provided.

Neither of the meetings provided catering, so the focus of the meeting was all on fun, fellowship and business.

Children were welcome at both meetings.

Hybrid options were possible at both meetings.

One of the clubs built in a resume cover letter writing workshop as a service to the community immediately after they concluded their meeting.

Both clubs talked about making partnerships with other organisations as one of the main focuses of their service.

Both clubs had random community members to see what they were doing and be interested in potential membership.

If you want to be part of the community, go where the community is.

Where do young families go? The Library.

Libraries are looking to re-invent themselves.

So are Lions clubs.

It makes a perfect partnership". End. Interesting article, worth considering? What do you think?

The school and parents of the students have shown great support for the program over the past 3 years, and I hope will continue to do so. The teachers are awesome and attendance with their students at the screening makes everything run smoothly.



When running a program such as this, great care is taken by LEHP and our club to respect the privacy of the students and their respective parents, so other than at the screening, no contact with either students or parents afterwards is LEHP policy.

That does mean, unfortunately, that we receive little or no feedback as to the success or otherwise of the program in the school. Therefore, we have nothing to measure against to determine if our goals, or that of the school, are being met. Of course, it could be argued that as we have been asked to return each year, it means the school and parents are happy with the program!

The program involves four areas for screening: Visual Acuity, Colour Perception, Depth Perception and the camera which photographs the eyes to determine a number of additional visual problems which may be present.

We try very hard to get it right but there are times, of course, when LEHP results may not be perfect, but it is better to err on the side of caution than miss a problem which may impact a child's development because his/her vision is not quite as it should be.

In an outstanding coup for King Island, Australian Leo of the Year, Leada Blackie, has been awarded the prestigious title of "International Leo of the Year". The exciting news came from Lions International Headquarters in Chicago, USA.

A medal and certificate is due to arrive in Australia later in May and Lions Tasmania hopes to be able to present them to Leada at an appropriately significant event.

Only one nominee from each Constitutional Area (country or group of countries) is accepted for the award each year, based on the following criteria -

- Demonstrated outstanding leadership skills by holding Leo officer positions.
- Achieved a superior record as a Leo in implementing successful service projects.
- Made an identifiable contribution to the development and growth of the Leo Club
 Program by recruitment of 4 Leo members.
- Achieved distinction in community or school activities outside of Leo club commitments.

In her application, Leada told how the Leo Club Program (LCP) had equipped her with an abundance of transferable attributes that align with the organisation's core values of Leadership, Experience and Opportunity.

"The LCP has undoubtedly prepared me well for my role as an officer in the Australian Defence Force."

Leada is currently studying an Arts degree in Canberra and is looking forward to some family time on King Island in April.

The Lions Club extends its congratulations to Leada and is extremely proud to have supported her through the Leo program.

IMPORTANT TAX CHANGES

In the 2021-22 budget, the Commonwealth Treasury announced that, from 1 July 2023, non charitable income tax exempt not-forprofit organisations possessing an active ABN will need to submit online self-review forms to the ATO to remain eligible for the income tax exemption.

Previously, not-for-profit organisations have not been required to provide their self-assessments to the ATO, or obtain confirmation of their income tax status.

The new measures are intended to enhance trust and confidence in the sector by increasing transparency around the exemption to ensure only eligible not-forprofits access income tax exemptions.

The self-review report process is not expected to be onerous and is likely to be similar to how not-for-profit organisations can already conduct their self-assessment.

From 1 July 2023, a failure to lodge the self-review report may trigger penalties under the ATO's penalty framework and loss of the not-for-profit's exemption from income tax.

While the new measures will add to annual reporting obligations, the ATO's confirmation of exemption may give comfort to not-for-profits from a compliance perspective, particularly regarding penalty concerns should the organisation be subject to an ATO audit.

This new self-review process will likely apply to Lions Clubs, as Lions Clubs fall within the "Community Service organisations" group of self-assessing income tax organisations – refer links to, and extracts from the ATO website below.

The online system for submission of the self-review forms is still in development by the ATO, and there has also been no advice from the ATO to date regarding the lodgement deadlines for the online self-review forms.

Further information will be provided once details are available from the ATO.

If your organisation is not a charity, it can self-assess - if it is exempt from income tax, It does not need to be registered with the ACNC or endorsed by us to be exempt. To self-assess, you need to take the following steps:

1. Check the types of income tax exempt organisations.

Check the Types of income tax exempt organisations to see if your organisation fits within any of the types listed.

2. Check your organisation meets all the requirements.

If you think your organisation fits within any of the types of exempt entities, check the requirements for that entity type to make sure your organisation meets all the requirements.

For many of the exempt entity types, your organisation must be not-for-profit" and also meet the following conditions:

- pass one of three tests
- · comply with all the substantive

requirements in its governing rules

 apply its income and assets solely for the purpose for which it is established.

A community service organisation is a not-for-profit (NFP) society, association or club established for community service purposes except political or lobbying purposes.

Your organisation will be exempt from income tax, and can selfassess its exemption, if it meets all of the following requirements:

- it is a not-for-profit society, association or club
- it is established for community service purposes (except political or lobbying purposes) • it is not a charity
- it meets one of the three following tests
- physical presence in Australia test
- DGR test
- prescribed by law test
- it complies with all the substantive requirements in its governing rules
- it applies its income and assets solely for the purpose for which it is established.

Purposes

The main purpose of the organisation must be community services. To work out your organisation's main purpose; look at your organisation's constituent documents; activities; use of funds and history.

Any other purpose of the organisation must be incidental, ancillary or secondary to the community service purpose.

Provide details of the Club involvement, the impact your project has had on the Club and the community you serve:

Our association with Sandhill started approximately three years ago, when we were asked to make a donation to help purchase some specialised interactive equipment.

Our club investigated and donated funds, and as part of that interaction, we were then asked to continue our association by forming a small group to visit the facility every fortnight and help in activities - some of which are surprisingly energetic.

The original equipment we helped purchase is a Tovertafel. It's an amazing piece of interactive technology from Holland that is proving to be a game changer in helping people maintain skills and assist living with the onset of dementia. Residents are enthralled by the colorful and everchanging patterns projected onto a work table. Care staff have been especially trained in using the facility.

Members have actively teamed-up with elderly residents using the Tovertafel. They've also taken part in a number of other activities within the facility, such as – playing scrabble, helping with jigsaw puzzles,

playing eight-ball, taking part in the group exercises, going with residents on visitations to shows etc., and individual activities, such as totem-tennis, or walking residents outside the facility

On a more individual level (see attached photos) where Lion John usually has an exhausting time playing totem tennis in the patio, while Lion Angela often takes residents for a walk or a trip around the courtyard gardens by wheelchair. Lion Phil is popular for a group chat or a game of scrabble and also takes one of the more active residents for long walks. There's also a "Men's Shed" where we helped to make a very impressive papier-mache elephant. We also staff the coffee shop where Lion Dennis catches up with "the news".

The "drumming" activity is very popular. Each person sits down with a large rubber ball and a pair of sticks and follows a very lively video. Exercises are led by a staff member and lasts about half an hour. It provides excellent opportunities to improve breathing and general coordination. Lions Darrell, Dennis and Angela are seen "having a go"

Has the project been completed, or is it still on-going? (Please provide any detail)

This project is on-going. While there's been some difficulties attending from time-to-time because of Covid issues inside the facility, and/or when they were concerned about the potential ingress of Covid from outsiders. This had only stopped us from visiting for a few weeks. Of the Lions visiting team, there's been a regular 4-5 members taking part.

Feedback from the facility is encouraging. Residents have indicated that they value our involvement, and look forward to our visitations. They welcome the opportunity to mix with people from outside their facility.

We really enjoy taking part in this community project. We may only visit once a fortnight but we all feel welcome and have a terrific satisfaction in meeting and helping out our senior citizens in whatever activities we can.

The Club members continue to take part in this project. It's a simple project, but we've been assured that it provides residents with an opportunity to have a regular visiting friend or someone to take part in an activity.

SANDHILL Care Home in South Launceston is part of the Calvary Group. It's a very modern building with state-of-the-art facilities catering for 132 residents in individual rooms.

Our group has impacted on the majority of the residents by direct interaction with their activities, or in some cases by simply socializing over a cup of tea.
