

Greetings to all club Presidents, Secretaries, and Membership Chair Persons

This message includes a challenge for all clubs and comes about as a result of a change in our District's status. We are a District in trouble because we have fallen below the deemed district membership number of 1250 members. This means that we have been placed in "transition" with LCI. The time for talking and putting our heads in the sand is over. It is now time for urgent action not excuses.

Please read the information below not as a negative but a challenge that could lead to a new reinvigorated District and a new vibrancy in our clubs. We can turn a threat into an opportunity with desire, determination and commitment.

While many wonderful things occur in our District and we make a huge difference in many people's lives, the fact of the matter is that our District is in trouble. It has financial implications and will ultimately limit our ability to serve. Less members = less funds = less service.

At the MD Lions Council of Governors meeting in Sydney, Council determined that the 6 districts (including our District T1) in Australia are in transition status and are to begin a rebuilding program as a high priority.

This is the first step in a process that could see the districts re-aligned and reorganised. Support and help will be given by the Multiple District but we need to have a firm plan in place.

Those Lions who remember the bad experience in the past when Tasmania was forced to be part of a Victorian district would be very quick to urge us all to make sure that this does not ever happen again.

Now, we can beat ourselves up, debate what are the factors that have caused this or we can get on, "bite the bullet" so to speak and change our situation.



If each club was to have **a** net growth of one member we would no longer be in transition but I do not believe that this will save us in the long run. A rebuilding program will need to be done throughout the district and ultimately with all clubs.

We need to take a long hard look at our clubs and make positive changes to attract new members who will take this organisation forward. We need to move out of our comfort zone and take up the challenge, take some risks and grow.



To this end the District has invited <u>Lou</u> <u>Onley from the Multiple District</u> <u>Membership Team</u> to a rebuilding workshop in Launceston, the date is <u>Saturday 15 October</u>. Other details will be confirmed shortly.(see page 2. Ed.)

All clubs are invited to send representatives to provide input to the workshop with a view to providing an insight to how to go about this re building process.





Work is still going on preparing the Program.


Of course this cannot be completed until all the proposed business items have been received so they can be entered into it.


It's also time to decide on your Delegates. Have you elected yours?

Don't forget - The Convention dates are 11th – 13th November, so set those days aside in your calendar and come and join us for what promises to be an interesting and enjoyable weekend.



Hopefully your Club has ordered its supply of Cakes and Puddings for the rapidly approaching Christmas Season. Do you know the history of our Cake Program?

1965 Canada begins a Christmas Cake program.

1966 NSW Australia seeks a National fund raising program to support **"Save Sight".** The NSW Governor thinks the idea of selling cakes is crazy. The first **LIONS SAVE SIGHT CHRISTMAS CAKES** are baked by Big Sister and weigh 3 pounds.

1975 the cake becomes metric and converts to 1.5kg. It reduces in packaging from 12 to 10 per carton. This resolved many headaches with stock control records and book keeping became easier.


1983 Top Taste (division of George Weston Foods Ltd) takes over baking from companies including Arnotts, Sara Lee and Gartell White.

1988 1 kg cakes are introduced

2010 Formal introduction of Christmas Puddings

2012 80 gram Mini Cakes become available

It is estimated that since the inception of sales **\$52,000,000** profit has made its way into Australian Lions Clubs and **SAVE SIGHT** programs.









Greetings fellow Lions, Lioness, and Leo's.

Just an update on my portfolio as your District representative on the National Committee of Lions Eye Health Program or LEHP for short. This meeting was held at Ciloms Airport Lodge, Melbourne. 25th and 26th of August just past and I have to say as usual was a full on event as we meet semi-annually.

The usual reports from all Districts were tabled, and item contained in them explained in detail as required. All coordinators or District Chairmen had been busy pushing for greater recognition by clubs for the role of LEHP across Australia. The fact that the message that does not seem to be getting through is that it is your program funded by your voluntary donations or levy per member that makes us able to function so that this important Save Sight project can be at the fore-front of the general public.



Sadly at the moment 201T1 is not supporting the project as well as it should. But it is my hope that Club boards take a closer look at the distribution of their Activities funds and allocate funding support to LEHP.



On a far brighter note, we were treated to an un-expected guest speaker from the Medical Supply Company Welch-Allyn who brought along a hand held electronic device known as a "Spot Vision Screener." It is a hand held, portable device designed to help you quickly and accurately detect vision issues on patients from 6 months of age through to adults.

Fast binocular screening with a onesecond capture time, from noninvasive one metre working distance.

Support AAP screening guidelines for early detection of amblyopic* risk factors

Automated screening provides thorough, objective, easy to understand "pass/refer" results.

Successful capture readings 97% of the time

Easy to use with minimal user training required

* Commonly known as "lazy eye" which if caught early enough can be remedied.

Your MD Committee is now setting up a work group to negotiate reduced cost for the supply to any or all districts who would give consideration to purchasing one for the screening of children in schools, and for the general community, as a part of the promotion of World Sight day and subsequent similar events.

Currently, with assistance your team of "Ambassadors" and other interested Lions will sound out relevant authorities to determine their support for such a scheme to be adopted. Not only in public schools, but private as well.

Now this is the dreaded cost of the devise \$8600.00. Now I have to be honest, I received from somewhere some information about this Screener prior to the final cabinet meeting for 2015-2016 year and we decided then that we would not proceed with it. Then along comes Mt Tom Mitchell with a unit, demonstrated its use, taught one of our committee members in five minutes and away we went.

On a humorous note, Mr Mitchell produced a result sheet for his family's cat and it was a perfect score.



The question is now would your Lions club support the purchase of, and the testing of your children and relatives to ascertain their possible eye health needs? Just \$150.00 per club would all but purchase one for use in the district. Think about it please.

A report on District Activity in 2015-16.

A total of US\$17,900 was donated to LCIF in the year by 22 of our 50 Clubs, whereas in the previous year US\$44,400 was donated by 29 Clubs. Donations ranged from \$70 - \$2,867. While it is disappointing that 28 Clubs did not donate last year, it is even more disappointing that 6 Clubs have not donated for the last 5 years.

While the Tasmanian donations were down last year, so was the total for MD201. US\$571,469 down from \$839,172 in 2014-15. Only 2 Districts managed to increase their donation from the previous year. Much of the down turn in donations must be attributed to demand from local and national appeals as a consequence of the ever increasing need in Australia floods, fires and droughts.

The recognition of Lions members by their Club was again very pleasing. As previously 17 Lions were recognised with either Melvin Jones Fellowships [14] or Progressive Melvin Jones Fellowships [3].

In total MJF credits for Clubs exceeds US\$100,000, representing 85 full MJFs in credit by 29 Clubs.

To the future 2016-17

In this new year, the Centenary of Lions Clubs International, it would be great to have every Club in the District make a contribution, however small, to LCIF. It should be noted that as a bonus all Clubs would then have achieved one of the mandatory requirements for the Club Excellence Award, and at the same time make a worthwhile contribution to our international efforts as Lions.

Contributions by individual Lions result in recognition for the member's Club. Such contribution can be made as direct donations for one of the recognised purposes such as 'Disaster', 'Measles' etc. or as a non-specific donation as a Contributing Member at various levels - bronze A\$35, silver A\$70 and gold A\$135. For each level a special Centenary pin has been produced for contributors. Contributing Member's donations do not qualify for Melvin Jones Fellowships.
