"READING. WRITING AND RIDING"... How it works!

"Reading, Writing and Riding" is a program, operating at True Trails which aims to assist children with learning difficulties in literacy.

The uniqueness of this program lies, not only in the individual tuition, but also in the coupling of participation in horsemanship activities with literacy. The practical, hands-on nature of this program makes it very suitable to a kinaesthetic style of learner. Horsemanship requires many character traits, abilities and learning aptitudes essential for learning and the attainment of knowledge.

Horsemanship activities require:

- Focused concentration
- The ability to persevere through difficulties
- The need to listen, focus and comprehend instruction
- Processing and learning a number of tasks and combining these
- The ability to undertake repetitive tasks and see the possible outcomes
- Positive communication (verbal and non-verbal)
- Care and respect
- Willingness in participation, firm direction from the rider
- Processing thought into action, and the desirable outcomes of doing so.

These character traits, learning aptitudes and abilities are easily identified in the horsemanship arena and are essential to horsemanship. The inspirational nature of horse riding and care is often highly motivational for children. Once motivated to develop the essential abilities/aptitudes for

horsemanship and see the outcomes, the participants are then able to understand the need to develop these in other spheres of learning.



Basic Session Outline

After full inductions the participant is involved in supervised hands on activity with the care and preparation of the horse before and after riding, encouraging a sense of responsibility, relationship, and personal care with the horse/pony.

The participant engages with supervised and instructed horsemanship and riding instruction in an arena. During this instruction, personal aptitudes and abilities are identified. These identified aptitudes and abilities are then transposed into activities in literacy.

Literacy activities are incorporated into the arena riding instruction and during hands on horse care activities. Learning difficulties/barriers are identified during these activities. Strategies to assist with these are then undertaken and developed during further "in arena" riding instruction according to the participant's need.

Desk tutoring time is then undertaken for 30 to 40 minutes in each session. During this time aptitudes, abilities and strategies are further developed and implemented in a more formal learning environment with activities tailored to encourage the participant's willingness to learn, read and write.

Literacy based tasks are set to undertake at home and be returned at the following session. These tasks include; handwriting, phonetic flashcard activities, reader books, and literacy initiatives based on horse care and knowledge.

The participant completes his/her own personal learning journal. This allows the participant to personally identify and clarify his/her progress.

Liaison with parents and the school is undertaken also.

The underlying focus of this program is to make learning a fun-filled and exciting journey!!

This is a new, innovative and developing program. The Individual assessments determine the level and type of literacy based activities and horsemanship activities undertaken in each session.

Each session is for a duration of two hours, undertaken by a certified instructor, qualified teacher, and covered under relevant insurances and codes of practice.

The Lions Club of Sorell were asked for funding support to continue for either six or eight weeks. Having deemed this a very worthwhile community programme and were unanimous in agreeing to fund the activities for the full eight (8) weeks and buy a kids western second hand saddle (pictured) which will greatly aid this programme, as the stirrups length of the current saddle are inappropriate and inadequate for safety standards. The total cost was just over \$1300, but money very well spent!



"From Little Things Big Things Grow"

A chance discussion on a breakfast show in Gosford in the late 1990s led to the establishment of a unique community-based fundraiser. An initiative which has changed the lives of thousands of Australian children and their families throughout regional Australia.

After a parking station refused to accept five (5) cent pieces as payment the question was asked, "what are five (5) cent pieces good for?" A listener phoned in and suggested "why don't we collect all of those useless five (5) cent pieces – then donate the money to the Children's ward at the hospital?" So they did!!!

This simple coin drive has now developed into a national fundraiser known as "Give Me Five For Kids".

The name "Give Me Five For Kids" has a two-fold meaning. The original - simple act of give "five (5) cent pieces", - has been overtaken these days by the symbolism of "giving a hand" to sick children.

Thousands of dollars are raised in the name of "Give Me Five For Kids" in Tasmania each year and one fundraising project in southern Tasmania this year is the auction of a newly-constructed house at Glebe Hill.

New Norfolk Lions played their part in preparing the house for auction when they turned up to construct some garden paths, garden beds and do the planting.



Vale




Alastair was a very active member within the club and served as a vice president on many occasions. He also served on many committees within the club.
