From Launceston to Launceston – a Lions' Journey

On the 12 June this year, we as members of the Lions Club of Launceston Windmill Hill, visited Launceston in Cornwall to prepare the way for a Twinning of our Clubs. This was done as a part of our family visit to Europe and the UK.

Welcome to Launceston, Cornwall - Dynnargh dhe Lanstefan, Kernow

We were warmly welcomed by the "Launceston Lions Club – and, being used to calling home "Lonceston" it was quite a challenge to come to terms with the local pronunciation of Lanston (it derives from the original Cornish name of LANSTEFAN) - however it is more appealing than "Lawnceston"! So where we call "Lonnie" in Tasmania, it will be "Lannie" in Cornwall!

The Cornish name for Cornwall is "Kernow" and the Cornish flag is the cross of St Piran (Baner Peran) which is a white cross on a black background as shown.

The population of Cornwall is about 500,000 – comparable with Tasmania – while Launceston has about 12,000 residents. The ancient administrative capital of Cornwall was once Launceston, protected by its Castle, but it is now The City of Truro.



Two recent articles in the Sunday Examiner did outline some of the history of the 'other' Launceston, so I will not repeat what was in those excellent articles, only to say that, the Launceston, Cornwall was the birthplace of Phillip Gidley King, a former Governor of NSW – this was when the northern Van Diemen's Land settlement was transferred from Georgetown to the Tamar–Esk rivers junction and called Patersonia – and then also renamed 'Launceston' in honour of Governor King.

Some interesting facts. Both Launceston's have a nearby Exeter – our Launceston in Tasmania is the regional centre – but in England, Exeter is the regional centre – although both Exeters' are in different counties. If you want a Devonshire tea in Launceston, Cornwall –

then drive a few miles east – and you will be in Devon county for the real thing! But Cornwall is the spiritual home of the Cornish pastie and yes, they are delicious - the original and the best! So sit on the nearby county border and enjoy both a Devonshire tea and a Cornish pastie (who said the English can't cook!). The capital of Truro (is the only true city in Cornwall) – it is further west towards Penzance and not far from Falmouth!

<u>Launceston Castle</u> - After a millennium, still protection the gateway to Cornwall. Note St Piran's flag flying proudly!

We were welcomed by some Lions Club of Launceston prior to the scheduled meeting. Their membership includes some of the town's serving councilors and we had several "photo opportunities" in the town square area prior to the meeting in the White Hart Hotel (which incidentally was featured in the Sunday Examiner articles). During our visit, Launceston was

preparing for the Charles Causley Festival, Launceston's Festival of Literature and the Arts. This involved the off duty Deputy Mayor and his assistants hanging up bunting in the town centre, highlighting the war memorial as the kingpost for the bunting. When I remarked that they should not have gone to so much trouble erecting bunting just for our visit, *I was promptly wrapped up in some of the bunting!*





We had thought that the formal meeting would be just a Lions Club to Lions Club event, with only those council members that were members attending, so we were surprised when the Mayor of Launceston, Clr David Gordon, and Lady Mayor

attended in full regalia along with the previously met Deputy Mayor, Clr Brian Hogan along with a past mayor as well! The president of Launceston Rotary Club also attended adding to the significance of the event.


LEGO EXPO A GREAT SUCCESS

Everyone was so pleased with the Expo, it was decided to have another, on the same weekend next year. Hope to see you there!




