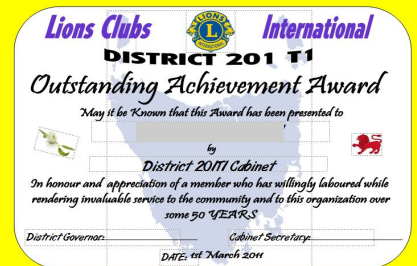

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JAPAN Disaster Assistance

My Dear Fellow Lions and Leos,

I am deeply humbled by the generous outpouring of support from Lions worldwide to my call last week to donate funds to the Foundation's Japan Relief Fund. Already, LCIF has received donations or **commitments exceeding US\$6 million**, including US\$3 million that the Lions of Japan are working to raise themselves during their own crisis. Again, it's so very humbling to see such compassion by the network of caring Lions and Leos worldwide. I thank all who have already donated from the bottom of my heart.

With the expected death toll now exceeding 18,000 and rising, the devastation is clearly greater than anyone could have imagined. And more than 400,000 people are still in shelters, in the cold, often going without a hot meal for days on end.

Now that the roads have re-opened, Lions from all over Japan are sending relief aid from every corner of the country - 30 tons of rice is being sent from Sapporo, US\$50,000 worth of baby formula from Hokkaido, and women's health products from the southern area of Shikoku - all through the Lions network in Japan. Within a day of the disaster, many courageous clubs distributed 20 tons of food, water and emergency supplies, despite great risks and challenges to themselves. Even our Lions blue-colored Lions relief tents are being delivered to give shelter for Lions volunteers and other relief workers in the hardest-hit areas.

To distribute the aid effectively, the Lions of Japan quickly set up four Lions relief aid warehouses in affected areas. Lions are coordinating relief aid distribution with local government officials and with the Japanese Red Cross. As a result, Lions are helping coordinate blood donation campaigns within Japan.

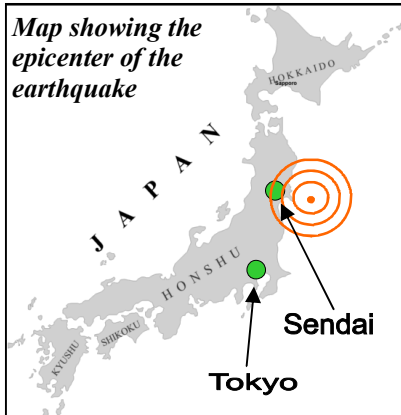
As you know, we have 31 Lions clubs in Sendai - the largest city affected by the quake - and nearly a club in every town up and down the coastline. Whether it is clothes and food today, or shelter next week, or a wheel chair the week after, Lions will be there to give dignity to those who have suffered such unimaginable pain and suffering.

While many of you have already generously donated, for which I am very thankful, please encourage your fellow Lions, Leos and friends to also donate. Please know that every donation will be put to careful use, and 100 percent will go to the cause. Also, donations received between March 11 and June 30, 2011 will be eligible for Melvin Jones Fellowships.

I am again humbled by your generosity to date. The Lions of Japan have always been there for the rest of us in times of need. So I am proud of you, and never prouder to be a Lion, when we come to their aid in the wake of this historic, awful tragedy.

Why the Poppy?



Today, fields of brilliant poppies still grow in France.

A writer first made the connection between the poppy and battlefield deaths during the Napoleonic wars of the early 19th century, remarking that fields that were barren before battle exploded with the blood-red flowers after the fighting ended.

During the tremendous bombardments of the First World War the chalk soils became rich in lime from rubble, allowing 'popaver rhoeas' to thrive. When the war ended the lime was quickly absorbed, and the poppy began to disappear again.

After John McCrae's poem In Flanders Fields was published in 1915 the poppy became a popular symbol for soldiers who died in battle.

Three years later an American, Moina Michael, was working in a New York City YMCA canteen when she started wearing a poppy in memory of the millions who died on the battlefield.

During a 1920 visit to the United States a French woman, Madame Guerin, learned of the custom. On her return to France she decided to use handmade poppies to raise money for the destitute children in war-torn areas of the country. In November, 1921, the first poppies were distributed in Canada.

Women In Lionism

In 1987 the Lions International Convention approved an amendment to our constitution by removal of the word male as a criterion for membership in a Lions Club. Membership to a Lions Club or any of its sponsor clubs - e.g. Lioness and Leos is still by invitation only. Lions Clubs International recognize the important role that all facets play in the International scene of Lionism.

In Australia we have a very active Lioness movement. This movement was somewhat jarred in 1992, to receive advice from International that Lioness clubs could no longer be autonomous, and must be under the sponsorship of a Lions club. This has always been the situation.

However in some parts of the world the Lioness movement had become so strong that Lioness districts were formed, each with its own district governor. If this were extended to the Leo movement, the International Board would have been in absolute chaos. This could have led to a conflict and a challenge of control.

I doubt if there would be any Lion who could deny the amount of work and support that Lionism owes to our Lioness movement. I doubt strongly if the International board wanted to hurt the movement, but something had to be done. Lioness clubs are no different from Leo clubs. They have always been a sponsored activity of their Lions club, and yet Lioness members saw their strength and were asking to be recognized.

Since receiving those advices from the International Board much has been said and written about where the Lioness movement is heading. What is its future? Some say that the Lioness will be become a Ladies Auxiliary. Others say that the Lioness movement will cease to exist, with all Lioness becoming Lions. The other suggestion is that the Lioness movement will grow stronger. I believe the last argument and my reasoning for this is the reasons for the Lioness movement have not changed since their formation.

Let us examine the membership criteria for a Lioness club :

1. Members do not have to have an affiliated partner in a Lions club.
2. There is no rigid attendance criteria.
3. Cost of participation is minimal.
4. Lioness members can participate in most Lions Club activities.
5. In some cases there are ladies who because of personal circumstances, do not wish to be seen in a fraternizing situation with male Lions, but do enjoy the company of other ladies.

The International Board recognizes the value of the Lioness movement and Ladies in Lionism, and in this regard I quote from The Lioness International Newsletter, wherein Past International President Donald E. Banker said :

"I doubt if there would be any Lion who could deny the amount of work and support that Lionism owes to our Lioness movement."

"The members of the International Board of Directors have given much thought to your comments over the past months. We continue to believe that the change enacted is in the best long-term interests of Lions Clubs International.

The responsibility, the obligation of the International Board of Directors is to do what is best for The International Association of Lions Clubs. Our purpose at all times must be to strengthen the essential structure of our association.

My friends, the cornerstone of Lions Clubs International has, and always will be - SERVICE. I know that this will remain true whether the Lioness choose to remain affiliated with their local Lions club, or choose to become members of Lions Clubs International. Service is our pride. It is what makes us the most effective service club Organization in the world.



Lioness clubs will be able to use the Lioness name and emblem - there are no plans to charge for the License required to maintain our trademark of the name. Lioness clubs will be covered by the association's liability insurance. Club supplies and awards will continue to be made available for purchase.

Some things will not change - the focus of Lioness members on community and world service - nor will there be a change in the countless Lioness community service programs and projects. Those are Lioness club programs that fully reflect the humanitarian spirit and commitment of Lioness to the Association."

Unless our Club took this stand.

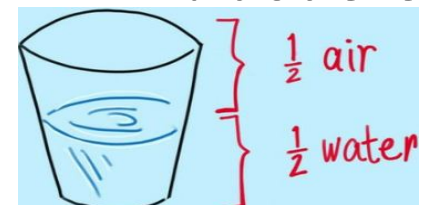
So we toiled with saw and paint pot

The weather was fine and within two hours our group finished picking up rubbish, plenty of stubbies and cans, however a 'road kill' was a bit off putting!

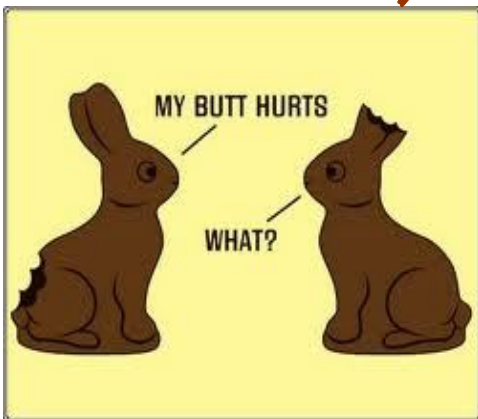

Congratulations to Lion Dick Strickland who has received this very special honour. As you know, Dick has a long and well deserved list of community, sporting, farming and personal achievements, but here are five things you may not know about our 2011 Senior Citizen.

Q: You list 8 sports with dozens of awards, but what is one game you wish you could have supported and played on King Island?

A: There are no other sports I could have played. We had visiting teams for cricket, football, golf, tennis and table tennis and I am only sorry that we had no visiting badminton teams.

Q: As a recipient of a Tasmanian and Antarctic Meteorological Bureau award, what is your opinion about global warming?

A: I am rather a skeptic. King Island had a 10 year rainfall average in 1900 of 475mms of rain with 347mms in 1897.

Much drier than the last 10 years drought. Temperatures and rain have all been higher or lower than the last few years.

Q: You have done everything humanly possible for Lions, but what has Lions done for you?

A: Lions has given me great friends and fellowship over 42 years and made me realise what Lions can do for the community. By attending seven < 7 > International Conventions and many MD and District Conventions, it makes one realize what Lions International does for sight in places like Africa and disasters around the world.

A: Her ability to handle crises in my health problems. Her great rapport with her grand children and her need to help in the community with things like Lions and helping the Oldies. Her home making qualities.

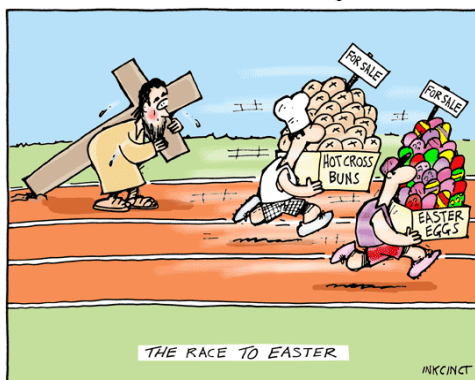
