

#### DG Michael's Musings....

Most Club visits have been completed and thanks to 1VDG Hester and 2VDG Vere for helping out as well. It has been suggested by LCI that the DG visits be rotated between the DG and the two VDGs so that each will visit all clubs at least once. In practice this is not easy to achieve.

I have found that all club visits are special in many and different ways and I thank all clubs for their hospitality and fellowship. My recent visit to the **Flinders Island Club** shows what a Lions Club can achieve. With a population of about 650 the club has a membership of 27 and an extensive community based service program. A great effort. Having said that though the same comment applies to many of our clubs in small communities.



During February we visited St Helens, St Marys, Rosebery, Zeehan, Tasman and Spring Bay as well as Flinders Island and all of these clubs are doing great work in their communities.

During club visits I have been asked about the likely impact of our District being placed in transition.

All Districts in Multiple District 201 need to comply with the Constitution of MD 201 and the Constitution of LCI . The Constitutions state that all Districts must have at least 35 clubs and 1250 members.

I have been asked what is the reason for LCI requiring a minimum of 35 clubs and 1250 members. I am told that advice received by LCI is that these are the lowest numbers for a District to be able to be a viable economic unit.


We have 50 clubs but our membership has been less than 1250 for some time and as at the end of February the District membership stood at 1214.

When a District is in this position the MD Council of Governors can place the District into transition which means that the District has 2 years to show that is can maintain membership of over 1250. At the August meeting of the Council of Governors six Districts were placed in transition.

The process from now on is interesting and next month I will explain more.

From discussion with other DGs it has emerged that the process that our District has adopted to manage the Global Leadership Team and the Global Membership Team as well as management issues generally is probably the best in the MD. Because of this other Districts have asked me to send them details of our GMT and GLT process and this has been done. Congratulations are due to those Lions who established our districts processes.

#### **LIONS DISTRICT 201T1 - ALLERGY AWARENESS PROGRAMME**

Two generations ago, EPIPENS® were unheard of and taking peanut butter to school in lunch boxes did not provoke debate between parents. Back then allergies were uncommon, especially food allergies.

Now, around 1 in 50 children in Australia has a peanut allergy.In 2013 a team of researchers found 1 in 10 children aged 12 months, living in Melbourne alone, had a food allergy, which was the highest incident of food allergy ever reported in the world.

In 2014, the Australian Bureau of Statistics revealed that almost 4 million people in Australia reported avoiding a food type because of allergy or intolerance. Of those, about 560,000 were children aged between 2 and 18 years. With numbers on the rise every year in Australia, this is becoming an epidemic.

To have an anaphylaxis reaction caused by an allergic reaction to a food or other cause can be fatal.

**Deaths from anaphylaxis** are relatively **rare** in Australia. Researchers have examined anaphylaxis fatalities and hospital admission rates between 1997 and 2013 to determine whether the rate of death from anaphylaxis in Australia has increased in line with anaphylaxis admission rates. Data derived from the Australian Institute of Health and Welfare and the Australian Bureau of Statistics showed there were 323 cases of fatal anaphylaxis reported between 1997 and 2013. Food was the second highest known cause attributed to the anaphylaxis, accounting for 23 of the cases. Medication was the highest, being attributed to 52 cases. The cause of the fatal anaphylactic reaction was not specified in 220 cases, with the remaining attributed causes being classified as insect stings, tick bites or serum. Hospital admission rates for food related anaphylaxis increased 10% per year, and similarly, food related fatal anaphylaxis increased 9.7% per year across the period studied.

Total hospital admission rates for all causes of anaphylaxis increased by 8% each year, compared to a 6.2% increase in the rate of **fatal anaphylaxis** across the same period.

While this preliminary evidence (presented to the 2016 AAAAI Annual Meeting) indicates a rise in Australian fatal anaphylaxis rates comparable with the increase seen in hospital admission rates, the author states that the data contrasts with recent UK and USA based studies that report lower overall fatal anaphylaxis rates. These international studies are said to show rising hospital anaphylaxis admission rates without a rise in fatalities.



"BE A PAL WITH ALLY THE OWL AND BECOME ALLERGY AWARE"

The Lions Club of Mersey Devonport has run an Allergy Awareness Project for the last two years at Devonport. We have had two local primary schools hold a Allergy Awareness Day, resulting in about \$2000.00 being raised and sent to Allergy Research programmes. The Allergy Awareness Day has been run by the School Council students, involving staff members and all students at the school. The Allergy Awareness Day gives the students the opportunity to donate a \$2 coin for a Allergy Awareness Wrist Band, the students are also encouraged to wear a blue top for the day.

Staff members are requested to inform their students with information about food allergies and the requirements for the safety of students with allergies.

We are aware the Education Department has allergy protocols with guidelines from the Asthma Foundation guidelines. The Lions Allergy Awareness Programme is not changing any of these protocols, but running in conjunction with these protocols.

We have found this to be a day of fun and awareness by all students and staff.

All Lions Clubs in District 201 T1 have been sent information relating to this programme.

We need your assistance to promote allergy awareness and to raise much needed money to be directed into Allergy Research.

#### **LCIF LIONS MEASLES INITIATIVE**

Members will remember that several years ago LCIF initiated a partnership with 3 international institutions, the Bill & Melinda GATES Foundation, the GAVI Alliance and UKaid. The purpose being to stop measles by worldwide vaccination of children.

With LCIF support, Lions are working in 15 of the poorest countries where measles and rubella pose the greatest health threat through supporting vaccination campaigns and routine vaccination.

The target was to raise **US\$30** million by our Centenary in 2017. For every Lions dollar raised a further dollar is being contributed by the Gates Foundation and the UK Department of International Development. **There is now only \$7.4** million to go.

The measles vaccine cost just \$1, so every dollar donated saves 2 lives.

Clubs are urged to commit their LCIF contributions this year to the Measles Initiative. by sending donations to the Cabinet Treasurer, marked 'LCIF Lions Measles Initiative' and help to reach the \$30 million target.

#### **Queenstown Lions Club**

**Queenstown Mining Disaster Memorial:** 42 Name Plaques with the names of each of the Miners killed in the mining disaster. The Fountain which will be the central feature will include a huge bowl that a huge Sculpture will be mounted and lighting will be fitted. Club Members have been working many hours on their Community Legacy Project for completion this Centennial Year.









The Sculpture (below left) has around 900 kilos of bronze in it and it stands 4 metres tall. The Sculpture will be mounted onto the large yellow bowl being the central feature of the fountain

**City of Devonport** - Purchase of a Toyota Mini Bus for transportation of disabled people from the local Special School of Education to assist them to integrate into the Community.

**Huonville** -Specially constructed Bus Shelter in Huonville. A second Shelter will be constructed if required.

**Lilydale** – Preparation of grounds around the Lilydale Swimming Pool.

City of Launceston – Children's Playship being erected in Launceston Royal Park.

**Forth Valley** – Upgrade and modernise Braddon's Lookout Area. Removal of overgrown shrubbery, replacement of Informational Plaques with new Photos /Information plus Bench Seating and new garden areas.

**Glenorchy City** -Development in conjunction with Local City Council of a new Community Park/ Reserve with BBQ,Playground,walking paths,irrigated green space. Network of pedestrian /bike paths running through the Reserve linking to prominent Community Hubs. Also planting of 100 trees.

Clarence- Mosaic Project- construction of a garden for the Disabled including wheelchair access and a social amenity area. Ongoing support and the inclusion of local school students is expected to extend over the next 10 - 15 years plus.

Sharing the Clubs that have reported their Community Legacy Projects:-

**Riverside** -The Australian Lions Childhood Cancer Research Fund-raising funds for the Genome Sequencing Project to test 400 children across Australia so that their treatment can be more targeted to their particular ailment. Rebuilding of a Maze in the Tailrace Park.

**Launceston Windmill Hill** – A project already completed, provided picnic tables at a new Park established at Mount Pleasant Estate in Launceston.

**Kingborough** -Proposing to erect a BBQ facility at Blackman's Bay Beach also looking at a project at the old Kingston High School.

**Latrobe** -Completed two raised garden beds to assist children at the Latrobe Children's Respite Centre which is a facility catering for needs of families with children with Autism Spectrum Disorder. Also proposing to erect a Gazebo in a local Park.

**Scottsdale** – Building a pathway one km long to connect the Rotary Rail with the North Eastern Caravan Park. The Club will be erecting a sign celebrating 100 years of Lions on the framework of the Town Clock in the main street of Scottsdale The Clock was a donation by Lions to the Town in the early 60's

**Smithton Circular Head** -Donation to the Smithton RSL Club for the erection of seats outside the RSL Club to go along with the Silhouettes.

**Sorell -Orielton Loop Walking/Cycle Track** The club is the sole partner with the Sorell Council on this project which is funded in part by a grant, the council and our club. The planning is being advanced by the council with physical work expected to start in March 2017 to lay a consolidated gravel track approx 10km long. This is a Legacy Centenary Project in which the club will provide seating and shelters, signage and environmental interpretation for the lagoon which is a significant bird sanctuary. There is also an opportunity for physical involvement in delivering this project.

Seven Mile Beach Environmental Project The club has provided assistance to Council and other local coast care groups in removal of juvenile radiate pine, bone seed and lupin (all considered weeds) from the Seven Mile Beach coastal reserve to allow the area to return to a more native Tasmanian bush reserve. Some coastal wattle is also being removed where indigenous white gums are growing. This has been an ongoing project over several years the most recent being December 2015 and March 2016. This Centenary Legacy Project will extend to provide additional planting of indigenous trees. Some assistance with providing a multi use pathway through the reserve area may also form part of this project which may include support.

#### North East -Derby Public Showers

In partnership with the Dorset Council and with financial support from the Tasmanian Lions Foundation, the North East Lions Club has developed a public hot shower facility at Derby.

The establishment of over 40 kilometres of mountain bike trails in the hills above Derby has attracted a great influx of mountain bikers to the town. They use the trails on an individual basis or as competitors in major events.

The showers are an essential element of Derby's infrastructure, catering not only for mountain bikers but also for visiting tourists who make use of the nearby camping ground.

While the Dorset Council constructed the shower bays within an existing Council building, the North East Lions Club was responsible for the cost of installing the showers and the associated electrical, plumbing and gas fitting at a cost of \$9,500. Half of this amount was generously provided by a Tasmanian Lions Foundation grant and the remaining \$4,750 was from Club funds.

The North East Lions Club is responsible for the management and maintenance of the showers.

The financial return from the showers is encouraging with the Club's contribution towards the installation costs already being exceeded by the profits of shower usage during this financial year.

**Port Sorell** -New Defence Memorial Project.



**Bicheno** -Donated funds to celebrate the Centennial year to the Music Department of the St Mary's High School. Funds to assist the Little Penguins Child Care Centre.

**Georgetown** -Proposing to install a Compass and also provide a table and seat to an area at end of Town (near Monument ) once the Local Council are ready to refurbish the said area.

If there are other Clubs that have Centennial Community Legacy Projects completed or in progress or planned please advise as I will require to list in District's Reports.

Congratulations to the above Clubs as excellent work as this certainly helps us all to celebrate the Lions Centennial Year.

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
It is amazing that when you fail to follow your usual practice of downloading the "Lions Quarterly" from the LCI Website, it will be the one that has something that answers a lot of questions posed in the paragraph above. Partially hidden was a URL for a video called "Lions-Kidsight" and that is not a spelling mistake. <a href="https://youtu.be/Rxt0vb1TMvs">https://youtu.be/Rxt0vb1TMvs</a> I encourage all of you to view it. I do have a down- loaded copy of it for any club that wants it. I just wished I had this video when I visited Hadspen-South Esk Lions a few weeks ago.

At our semi-annual meeting in Melbourne 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> of March 2017 which I have to say was full on, five things that came out of it was,

- 1. That the National committee working group that is overseeing the purchase of Vision Screening cameras are negotiating a better buying price.
- 2. Most importantly: That they will be designing a business plan for the use of these devices so that we are all working to the same recommended plan. (Take note City of Launceston and Hadspen-South Esk, in answer to a question posed at Carrick last month.)
- 3. Encourage Districts, Zones or clubs to buy through the Lions Eye Health Program manager all cameras to get the advantage of cost and the ability to not have to pay the GST that otherwise would be paid.
- 4. Remember that short fall on funding that clubs, and Zones are able to apply to the various Foundations for top up funds.
- 5. The three cameras bought by LEHP Management will be used for training purposes at this stage. They will be at the MD Convention in Hobart. I also encourage all Ambassadors to make the effort to register for the convention.
  - This is of interest to the District Ambassadors. You are all accredited MD201 LEHP Ambassadors. You are able and not restricted to our district alone and if a call to assist a neighbouring district and available, go for it. Naturally that arrangement would come via myself. At the moment PDG Michael MacLaren is assisting PDG Trevor Jacobs LEHP Representative 201C2 with liaising with the five clubs in the Darwin area while he is there. There is no Ambassador/s in the Top End and very little exposure to LEHP. It is an area in urgent need of assistance due to the indigenous population in Darwin and districts, Bathurst and Melville Islands in the Timor Sea.
  - In due course I will try and assemble all our Ambassadors to a social meeting where we can design a plan to get us all active in getting into clubs as guest speakers, at Zone meetings (A must) please take note Zonies. <u>Just 10 minutes of meeting time could be the difference in someone not losing their sight and an opportunity to view the Vision Scanners at work with children video.</u>

This now raises another point, I request all Ambassadors to go online and run off the application form foe "Working With Vulnerable Persons." As a volunteer the cost is \$18.30 payable at Service Tasmania offices and takes about six weeks to get through all the security checks. You will be required to have the "Blue Card" to screen children and people with disabilities. I will need to record the card number and pass on to our National Manager.

#### Regional Lions Leadership Institute,

#### Melbourne, February 2017

In February this year I was lucky enough to attend the Regional Lions Leadership Institute at Cilom Lodge, Tullamarine. Unfortunately I couldn't attend the first two sessions as I had to work, but upon arrival I found everyone to be really friendly. There were forty-nine participants from all over Australia and four facilitators.
