

Greetings, Lions and Leos!



We serve both our local and global communities, when and where people need our help. This service is made stronger through our global foundation. When you support LCIF, you are playing an important part in increasing our collective impact. Through your acts of service and generosity, you make life-changing outcomes possible. I want to thank everyone who has supported LCIF financially and acted as an ambassador to magnify our mission. As you read this month's newsletter, join me in celebrating all the good we do together, bringing help and hope to people in need across the globe. #### Lions International Response to Earthquake in Turkey and Syria

The earthquake that struck Turkey and Syria devastated communities, homes and families. When a humanitarian crisis of this magnitude strikes, Lions and Lions International are among the first to respond. LCIF quickly awarded a US\$200,000 grant to the Lions in Turkey, who are providing 16 prefab container buildings to the Hatay Province in southeastern Turkey to create a Lions Village for earthquake survivors. As relief needs continue to emerge, additional grants may be awarded. Your donation to the Disaster Relief Fund can be the difference for families struggling to cope with disasters like this one.



\*Donations received will be considered funds for the country indicated by the donor when specifically requested, and LCIF will only designate them to another disaster when the local Lions Disaster Relief Committee determines there is no further need in that country.

The earthworks preparation started recently with the concrete slab being poured shortly afterwards – such an exciting time for our Bridport Community!

We surveyed the North-East Community and received 100% support for the building of an Outdoor Basketball Court. have Also, we communicated with Jack Jumpers Tasmania, who are fully supportive of the development of an Outdoor Court at Bridport.

Lions Club of Bridport are utilizing a combination of funding:

- Funds from Lions Club of Bridport including income from our major raffle with over 25 prizes all generously donated by our Bridport/NE Community.
- PJ and LA Bingley Builders Pty Ltd professional services and materials, including \$5,000 in kind support.
- Hanson Concrete Supplies Scottsdale in kind support.
- Bridport Innovations \$12,000 a donation towards the H-C Basketball Court.
- Tasmanian and Australian Lions Foundation \$10,000 funding towards the Half-Court Basketball Project
- Dorset Council \$16,500 Matching dollar for dollar funding.
- Volunteer labour (Simon from Concrete Solutions for Concept Plan) donated professional services.

We gathered the following statistics on children playing basketball in the North-East Region:

#### Local Roster

This roster is played at the Scottsdale Stadium and draws children from the North-East Region:

- $\Rightarrow$  In 2018 5.2% of the local roster were from Bridport.
- $\Rightarrow$  In 2022 34.8 % of the local roster were from Bridport Dorset Eagles (Launceston roster made up of children from across the North-East).
- $\Rightarrow$  In 2019 9.3% of teams who played in Launceston roster are from Bridport.
- $\Rightarrow$  In 2022 41% of teams who played in Launceston roster are from Bridport.

This Basketball Facility will greatly enhance the current Lions Adventure Playground and offer a top-class facility for a wide

age group of both children and adults. Recent data on other playgrounds support the advantage of incorporating equipment on the one site to suit a diverse range of ages and abilities (River Bend Playground Sea Port and Regent Square in George Town).

The Lions Club of Bridport works very hard in our community and have donated over \$13,000 in the last 12 months to various organisations and community projects. We have 22 dedicated and hard-working volunteers. ## The Lions Leader

A series of Lions Policy and Procedure instructions and reminders for all Lions leaders from GLT Coordinator PDG Rob Mantach will feature each month.

March is the month that all clubs in T1 look to who is going to run their club in the 2023/24 year. There are a number of positions to be decided – either elected by the club or selected by the incoming president. To fulfil the needs of the club each position has a specific role so let us look at those roles.

<u>Club President</u> – chief executive of the club who presides over club and board meetings and calls the club to action to fulfil its program of service to the community. Maintains harmony within the club.

<u>1st Vice President</u> – stand in as leader when required. Assess club activities and set goals for the next year when president. The 1st VP also is the club leadership chairperson to develop other club members' leadership abilities for roles in the future.

<u>2nd Vice President</u> – stands ready in succession and lead specific committees and projects.

<u>Club</u> <u>Secretary</u> – keeps the club's history of official proceedings. Serves as the communication liaison between the club, district and association.

<u>Club Treasurer</u> – main bookkeeper of the club's financial accounts. Administration of membership dues, making deposits and recording expenses. The treasurer advises the club and board of all financial proceedings. <u>Club Membership Chair</u> – leads the charge in recruiting new members, orientation of new members in the club activities and nurturing relationships between new and old members.

<u>Club Service Chair</u> – coordinates all service activities in the club's service program. This role is often shared by a number of club members as project chairs.

<u>Club Marketing Chair</u> – a public relations role to keep the club activities in the public eye and promotes the club's service to the community.

<u>Immediate Past Club President</u> – assists the new club president in their role and often used to welcome members and guests to meetings and functions. Also is the coordinator for the Lions Clubs International Foundation who encouragers members to support the efforts of LCIF.

**Lion Tamer (optional)** – takes care of the club paraphernalia and assists to prepare for each meeting.

**Tail Twister (optional)** – promotes fun and good fellowship at meetings.

<u>Club</u> <u>Administrator</u> (optional) – support for the club president and secretary with administrative tasks associated with MyLCI and MyLion.

These club officers along with the club directors form the club board that has a specific accountability according to the club constitution.

The incoming club board should develop a plan for forthcoming year to continue the club's success. There is a number of resources available including the Club Quality Initiative, Plan for Your Club's Success and Your Club, Your Way to assist the incoming president and board in this planning process.

It is recommended that a club leader only serves in the role for 2 or 3 years consecutively and I note that 8 clubs in T1 had presidents repeat for more than three years and a further 7 clubs had their presidents for three years. The clubs need to examine the leadership potential within the club and the development opportunities available through the Lions Learning Centre and other sources.
