

The first was an invitation to the unveiling of the restored grave of Jessie Spinks Rooke that has been refurbished by the City of Burnie Lions Club over the past few months. The grave was found by historian Rodney Croome who requested assistance for its restoration. The unveiling was performed by Tasmanian Governor, the Honourable Barbara Baker, who gave a speech on the history of Jessie Spinks Rooke, a prominent suffragette and fighter for women's rights. The club also put on a morning tea for the attendees where the Governor was able to mingle and speak to many of the attendees.

The other special event was the 60th Charter Anniversary Dinner of the Launceston Windmill Hill Lions Club. The history of the club was provided by PDG Byron Dilworth and some club memorabilia was provided by Lion Derryl Hill. The function was chaired by club president Lion Peter Crack and Launceston Mayor Albert Van Zetten was in attendance along with Janie Findlay and Michael Ferguson, Members for Bass

During this past month we have been able to visit the clubs of Perth Tasmania, Lilydale, Burnie Emu Bay, Forth Valley, Tasman, Spring Bay, Kings Meadows and George Town. I was scheduled to visit Kingborough for their Charter Anniversary Dinner but a medical appointment prevented me from attending. Lions International have prepared a Strategic Plan to guide the organisation over the next few years. Part of that plan is to improve membership value and to build new models of service engagement. This will come with a program called Global Membership Approach (GMA) that has been effective in two Districts in Victoria and New South Wales and will be provided to all districts during 2022 and 2023. The Guiding Lion training that has recently increased the number of Guiding Lions available is the first steps in implementing the GMA.

Other parts of the Lions International Strategic Plan include the integration of the Lions Clubs International (LCI) and the Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) under one single brand of Lions International, a combined Mission Statement and increased corporate engagement. More details will be available as time rolls on.

This year I have asked every club through the Zone Chairs to have a close look at their own club and where they are going to be in the future. This is through surveys of asking each club member for their opinions on what they are getting out of their membership and how can the club better serve the community. I thank those clubs that have participated and the results of the surveys give guidance to the club of their future direction.

I hope to see many of you at the District Convention next month.

The Global Membership Approach equips districts to develop membership through a strategic process focused on

- Rejuvenating districts with new clubs
- Revitalising clubs with new members
- Re-motivating existing members with fellowship and exciting service
- Provide meaningful opportunities for leadership development

The strategy involves the fours processes of:

- Build a Team

Learn about Global Membership Approach and begin developing a team to implement the approach.

- Build a Vision

Conduct a SWOT analysis of the District, set goals based on the analysis

- Build a Plan

Review available resources and develop an action plan to achieve goals

- Build Success

Execute the plan with engagement across the District, track and report results, and make course corrections throughout the year.

Lions Club International will be rolling out the Global Membership Approach in 2022/2023.

Tribute Burnie Emu Bay Lions member Neil Thorne 1936 - 2021


Neil was son of a fur trapper, a keen hunter and all-round outdoors man; he loved to trout fish, often together with fellow Lions member Max Wood. Max says "he was a clever and successful fly fisher on both rivers and lakes and a life member of North West Flyfishers".

Neil was a charter member of Burnie Emu Bay Lions Club and could always be relied on to volunteer his time, organise and lend expertise to countless projects. He was a life member of the club and a Melvin Jones award recipient. Club members will tell you he was always he first to put his hand up when we called for volunteers. His enthusiasm, knowledge and sense of humour will be greatly missed by members.

Renowned Tasmanian botanical paper maker Joanna Gair presented a workshop on the ancient craft of making paper recently and dedicated her workshop to Neil Thorne, a passionate supporter of art in the Burnie region.

A gazebo funded by Burnie Emu Bay Lions planned for the new bicycle pump and Mountain Bike track in Burnie will be named in Neils' honour recognising his significant contribution to the Burnie community

The Thorne family emigrated from UK [1863] to Daylesford Victoria then relocated to Waratah. Neil hosted celebrations of the family's long history in Waratah in 2017, many descendants still live in the area. Neil was laid to rest in his beloved Waratah.





On Saturday 18th September all MD 201 LCIF Coordinators had their monthly Zoom Meeting with Tyrel Floyd LCIF Development Specialist, which for the first time included all the MD201 District Governors and will continue to invite them monthly.

There was 2 Guest Speakers PIP Frank Moore who spoke of the importance of Campaign 100 Empowering Service, and the goal of raising US\$3million before June 2020. It has raised US\$2202.873 and ongoing fundraising will need to raise a further US\$75 million. It is the largest fundraising program since Sight First 1&11. He outlined the importance of raising this money to enable LCIF to continue to serve the needs of at risk and vulnerable populations, requiring funding and services. As well as donations he asked for more Clubs to committee to becoming "Model Clubs" and the MJF Heroes campaign and Raise funds through

Asking individuals members to donate or pledge, Dedicating a fundraising event to Campaign 100, Make a donation to LCIF from Club Treasury, Asking members of the community to donate.

The 2nd Speaker was Rebecca Daou The LCIF Grants Coordinator who outlined all the 8 categories of Grants and how the Districts and Clubs, and the percentage of money that must be raised as it is not the same for all the Grants, to become eligible to apply for each Grant. Since 1968 Australia has received \$15,065.863 in Grants. The Childhood Cancer Grant has been very popular and received over \$2million.

In October there will be new fundraiser initiative for LCIF in Australia "Doing Good Rewards". On the 18th October at 7.30pm All MD 201 LCIF Coordinators and DG's will be invited to attend a Zoom Meeting .The Purpose of this session is to introduce a new reward/giving program for Lions Clubs Australia presented by Brad Langdon(CEO) Ishara Fermando (Operations /impact Manager) Doing Good Reward and Lo Onley and Rob Oerlemans. Should be interesting.



Unfortunately the family is limited where they can cycle with Mitchell as they are unable to transport his large and heavy trike.

Recently the family has been working with a local metal fabrication company to build a custom rack that will transport the trike plus two bikes

A member of our club was contacted from St Giles to ask if Kings Meadows Lions would be supportive to Mitchell's family by covering the cost of construction of the rack as the request is outside the guidelines of NDIS

Our members were only too pleased to help Mitchell and his family and wished them well with their adventures

Riverside Lions build mobile amenities unit for homeless in Launceston

Members of the Riverside Lions Club in Launceston Tasmania have built a mobile amenities unit providing Homeless people access to warm showers and a place to wash and dry clothes.

The club saw the need for all community members to have access to a safe space to shower and wash their clothes, so set to work building the unit from the ground up in the club's own work shed.

The club received a grant from the Tasmanian Community Fund and was also supported by a number of local businesses, particularly Samios Plumbing Supplies.

Construction of the unit totalled \$25,000 and the club was pleased to have Tasmanian Premier The Hon Peter Gutwein attend the opening.

The unit is located at the Shekiniah House centre for the homeless in central Launceston and is managed and maintained by a team of volunteers.
