






On Saturday the 14th April, 25 LEOs and LEO advisors from Tasmania's four LEO Clubs ventured to Poatina bright and early for a conference.

Co-operation leads to first class facility for Devonport children

On Wednesday 2nd May, the youth of East Devonport were treated to a new first-class skate park, courtesy of the Lions Club City of Devonport. The Premier, Ms Lara Giddings, opened the new facility which has an estimated value of \$150,000.

In 2006, three East Devonport Primary School boys collected signatures in their neighbourhood and petitioned the Devonport City Council for a skate park because, due to inadequate transport facilities, the existing park at the Devonport Bluff was out of reach for most young people from the eastern side of the Mersey River. While the Council supported the concept, funding was lacking.

Lion Grant Goodwin, the then Deputy Mayor, brought the project to the notice of the City of Devonport Club, and members agreed to support the concept. The Club's promise of \$20,000 towards the establishment of the park ensured that the construction was feasible.

A committee, under the Chairmanship of Lion Grant, managed the project. In addition to the Lions Club commitment, support totalling \$20,000 was obtained from the Tasmanian Community Fund, \$10,000 from the Devonport City Council, and \$3,000 from the Premier's Fund were the major financial contributors, while donations in kind were received from many local contractors and businesses, enabling the construction to proceed. Major donors included Australian Cement, Hazell Bros, Wooton and Byrne Pty Ltd, Steel manufacture, K&D Hardware, MDG Sand and Gravel, and Fairbrother Pty Ltd, whose generosity enabled the park to be constructed at cost.



When opening the skate park, the Premier congratulated the Lions Club City of Devonport for its financial input and efforts in co-ordinating community support to develop the facility. She was pleased to provide support from the Premier's Fund as her Government encourages the development of facilities that provide healthy activities for young people.

The park has already proved to be popular with the youth of East Devonport with skaters enthusiastically using the facility from daylight till dark.




What's wrong?? What changed?? You BECOME 21, you TURN 30, then you're PUSHING 40...stay over there, it's all slipping away....



THIS MONTH IN HISTORY...

- May 1, 1974: Australian publisher and media magnate Sir Frank Packer died, aged 67.
- May 2, 1977: In Longreach, Queensland, scientists discovered what was believed to be the largest concentration of dinosaur footprints in the world. Scientists claimed it was the scene of a battle between a huge dinosaur and a herd of smaller ones about 100 million years ago.
- May 3, 1961: Australian parliament voted 57-39 to deny Aborigines the right to vote.
- May 7, 2006: 60 Minutes journalist Richard Carleton died at a media conference covering the trapped miners' story in Beaconsfield, Tasmania. He was 62.
- May 8, 2011: Lionel Edmund Rose MBE (born 21 June 1948) - Australian bantamweight boxer, the first indigenous Australian to win a world title - died of heart failure; he had been unwell since suffering a stroke in 2007.
- May 9, 2006: The two miners Todd Russell & Brant Webb walked out from the Beaconsfield mine after having been trapped for two weeks since Anzac Day following a rock-fall. Larry Knight was killed in the accident.
- May 10, 1959: 150,000 people turned out to see American evangelist Billy Graham in Sydney.
- May 13, 1977: England cricket captain, Tony Greig, was sacked for signing up players to Kerry Packer's World Series cricket.
- May 14, 1984: Australian \$1 coins went into circulation.
- May 15, 2004: Tasmanian Mary Donaldson married Crown Prince Frederik of Denmark.
- May 17, 2000: Competing in the 200m butterfly at the Australian trials for the Sydney Olympics, Susie O'Neill broke the world's longest standing swimming record, held by Mary T. Meagher of America.
- May 18, 2003: Australia's front line troops were officially welcomed home from Iraq with the nation's leaders describing them as one of the finest forces in the world.
- May 19, 2002: Former Australian Prime Minister, John Gorton, died of respiratory failure at the age of 90.
- May 20, 1929: Australia's first Airmail stamp was issued.
- May 21, 1999: Nine bodies were discovered by police in a disused bank vault in **Snowtown SA**
- May 22, 1960: The largest global earthquake recorded in the 20th century occurred along the coast of Southern Chile. It measured 9.5 on the Richter scale and killed almost 2,300 people.
- May 25, 1930: Most of Darwin turned out to see flyer Amy Johnson after her 19-day solo flight from London.
- May 26, 1889: The first Eiffel Tower elevator was opened to the public.
- May 27, 1967: 90% of white Australians voted in a referendum for proposal to count Aborigines in the census and to allow the federal government to make special laws for them.
- May 28, 2003: Peter Hollingworth became the first Governor General of Australia to resign his office as a result of criticism of his conduct.
- May 29, 1975: The Australian Family Law Court was established.
- May 30, 1928: Cadbury's Dairy Milk Chocolate was first produced in Claremont, Tasmania.





Who is & what does the TLF do?

T.L.F. stands for *Tasmanian Lions Foundation*. It was created in the late 1970's as a way of helping Lions Clubs within the District to get involved in projects that were beyond the resources of a single Club. It is a fundamental part of the Lions organization in this State.

The basic principle is to create a pool of funds from donations by individual Clubs, and then make funds available from the pool to clubs in the form of grants to support worthy projects or to provide disaster relief. Clubs can obtain grants, but must contribute funds to the project. Hence, I believe we should donate to the T.L.F.

As Lions, we are part of the largest voluntary service organization in the world, and this gives us the capacity to be effective not only at our local community level, but on a district, a multiple district & international levels also.

Since our formation the T.L.F. has helped many worthy projects and will continue to do so with your continuing support.
