LIONS CLUBS INTERNATIONAL FOUNDATION

I have recently attended the Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) training day in Sydney.

Facilitated by Tyrel Floyd the Regional Development Specialist from LCI and PIP Barry Palmer the Chairman for the Constitutional Area V11.

LCIF has made some area restructuring, MD 201 now has a Coordinator for every State + District Chairman + LCIF Club Board Member. If the Clubs have not filled in this position on their PU101, LCI will automatically appoint the Past President of the Club.

These changes have been made to try and raise the awareness of LCIF throughout the world. AS LCIF is the fundraising arm of LCI.

As T1 is a small District, I have been appointed to the two (2) positions, Coordinator + Chairperson for three (3) years. My role is to educate Lions about the importance and impact in all aspects of fundraising in our District.

Campaign 100 has now been completed and raised \$US324,687.263 across the world. Our constitutional area raised over \$US6 million. It has been a huge success. PIP Dr. Jitsuhiro Yamada is coming to ANZI to thank our area for this result. But all our Clubs must continue to support LCIF

T1 District target for this year is \$19,853 which is PMA\$21.

LCIF Chairman PIP Douglas X. Alexander has asked that Clubs continue to support the "Melvin Jones Fellow" by using and adding to credits available. He states "Is a great way to thank Lions and non-Lions for their contributions by acknowledging their exemplary service". Also, donations may be made by Lions to contribute to a MJF for themselves by different ways of

201T1 District Goals 2022-2023

- 1 .By the end of the fiscal year all District Clubs will have embraced a minimum of 4 of the 8 causes(Childhood Cancer, Vision, Diabetes, Humanitarian Efforts, Hunger, Environment, Youth and Disaster Relief) by a participating Project or donation.
- 2. By the 31/12/2023 fiscal year the 201T1 District will have progressed with the Environment Project (CRS) to continuation/finalisation.
- 3. By the end of the 2022/23 fiscal year, the 201T1 District will increase the percentage of Clubs reporting to 100% participation.
- 4. By the end of the 2022/23 fiscal year, the District 201T1 will achieve a positive growth of Clubs (3) and membership by 15%,
- 5. By the end of the 2022/23 fiscal year to achieve a positive membership growth of Lions and Leos by identifying and leveraging opportunities to attract young professionals in the age group of 30-45 who are responsible, service minded individuals.
- 5. By the end of the 2022/23 fiscal year, the 201T1 District will have a target of 30% of Clubs to qualify for the Club Excellence Award.
- 6. By the end of the last Quarter of the 2022/23 fiscal year, the 201T1 District will conduct training for Club Officers and Zone Chairpersons to prepare them for the 2023/24 fiscal year. The District Leadership Team Coordinator will report all District training utilising the reporting portal in Learn which is to be completed by June 2023.
- 7. By the end of the 2022/23 fiscal year 35% of Lions members will be motivated and equipped to undertake leadership roles in their Clubs and on District level.
- 8. During the 2022/2023 fiscal year the District Clubs arrange to promote leadership training opportunities and manage succession planning for Club, Cabinet and District Officers.
- 9. By the end of the fiscal year 2022/23, the District will support the Lions Clubs International Foundation in its endeavour to achieve its work and worldwide projects. In addition the District Clubs will support the Australian Lions Foundation and the Tasmanian Lions Foundation to the best of their ability and by the end of the 2022-2023 fiscal year 201TI District will ensure all Clubs will achieve participation.
- 10. By the end of the fiscal year 2022/2023 all Clubs will have supported and embraced the Global Membership Approach programme and experienced growth.

- 11. By the end of the fiscal year 2022/23 the Regional Chairpersons and Zone Chairpersons will ensure the required support and adequate training and resources are available to each District Club on an ongoing basis
- 12. During the 2022/2023 fiscal year the GAT Team will meet on a monthly basis and a least two meetings will convened at a convenient location with all Regional, Zone Chairpersons and the GAT Team to discuss planning, current topics and issues.

New Members

There is a worldwide goal to increase membership because more members means more service for those that are unfortunate. So, your club has just invited and inducted a new member – **that's great.**

However, do you know that some of those new members that join clubs decide to leave within the first three years of being a member. The main reason that they leave is because they were not getting the satisfaction out of being a Lions member that they had expected when they initially joined.

During the new member induction process the new member should be provided with a *Lions Information Booklet – A Guide for New Members* to provide them with an insight into Lions generally, *including history of Lions Clubs International, Purposes, Ethics, Structure at Multiple District, District and Club Level plus information on where our subscriptions go to.*

However, this guide is only the start and all new members should be provided with an orientation of how their club works, what the club does, its traditions, what service projects that they support and how they raise funds. There are a number of resources available on the LCI website to help conduct Lions New Member Orientation including;

- The **New Member Orientation Training Guide** that helps the trainer plan and conduct new member orientation.
- The **New Member Orientation Guide** as a reference for the new member during orientation.
- The **New Member Orientation PowerPoint** which is a template for the trainer to conduct the orientation.
- The Basic Mentoring Guide to ensure the new member successfully completes the orientation program.

There is also a **New Member Welcome Booklet** and a **Lions Club International Facts Sheet**.

The club's Membership Chairperson is the officer that ensures that effective orientation takes place for new members and increases satisfaction among current members.

It is important that the new members are introduced to all of the members of the club so that they become familiar with the personnel. Similarly, each new member needs to be included on a service committee and be involved in what the club does in the community.

Lions Clubs International has a number of personal leadership development programs for current and future Lions leaders which will enhance our capacity

to provide much needed service in our communities as well as helping the member in their lives outside of Lions in their family unit or career.

The importance of new member orientation cannot be emphasized enough. The information presented during the orientation process provides a foundation for new members and helps them understand how the club functions, what their role will be and gives them the big picture of the district and the association.

To finish off here is a couple of questions from the **New Member Orientation Guide...**

- 1. Who was the first president of Lions?
- 2. What is the primary service activity of Lions Clubs worldwide?

Answers are on page 14.

The Rocky Cape Lions have been caretakers of their local park, Myoora Park, and its barbeque area on the

Park, and its barbeque area on the banks of the Detention River since 2002. The park has the largest forest of Tasmanian White Gums on the Northwest Coast.

In July 2022, three youth from the Smithton High School and their coordinator came out to Myoora Park. They worked with six Rocky Cape Lions members to clean up vegetation in the park and the barbeque area.

This is the second time the club have liaised with the Dudley to engage youth in community service. The first was in June when he brought two boys out to help stack wood for a local elderly resident with three of our Lions. Cleaning up the Myoora Park environment is nothing new for our club but involving youth from the high school is adding another dimension to their service because it is serving the youth as well. These boys are from troubled backgrounds and are often excluded from the classroom due to behaviour issues. The opportunity to engage with a community service organisation is giving them experience in looking after the environment and making a valuable contribution to the community. The boys were extremely keen and well behaved and have asked to come back again.

Congratulations to Rocky Cape for their entry. We wish them all the best at the multi-district level. Next year it would be great to see more club entries showcasing the outstanding work that happens in our clubs.

After we all packed up on Thursday, it was off home to prepare for the Dinner Meeting that night!


