At our recent Council of Governors meeting it was agreed that the MD office is to put together two packs with Australian content to be distributed to prospective and new members. The Standard Pack will contain a "Thinking about joining" document and online "Thinking about joining" details. This pack is at no cost as it is being sponsored by "Invocare" and will carry their logo on the back.

The Deluxe Pack will have the standard pack as well as a presentation folder, Pride in the badge booklet. We make things happen brochure and a Next Generation package. These packs will incur a cost of \$5.00 each.

Both packs should now be available from the MD office and would be a great tool to use if your club was conducting a membership drive or just something to hand to a prospective member to share what Lions do in their community.

I have just received our District membership numbers for the end of January. It is disappointing to note that if we remove the twenty-six (26) new members of the Brighton Lions Club our membership would be stagnant. We have inducted seventy-six (76) new members into our existing clubs and I congratulate all clubs and members who have given a new Lion the opportunity to serve their community. But in the same seven (7) month period we have dropped seventy-six (76) as well.

Why do we put so much effort into finding new members but don't reciprocate with looking after those that we already have?

I have learnt a lot regarding retention over the past couple of years and I believe that we need to work harder with our current membership base to ensure that those niggling little problems in our clubs don't fester into huge ones that will see members "resign in good standing" due to a disagreement with something that the club has done.

We also need to take the time to look after our members if they are ill, suffering financial problems or have sickness or a medical problem within their family. This is total club care. We need to treat each other as family. We cannot continue to leave our members to look after themselves if they are experiencing problems. We need to support them like we do the rest of our community.

We tend to forget that we are all volunteers doing the best we can for our respective communities. Why not be a volunteer toward your own members and take the time to treat each member with the respect and friendship that they deserve.

If we all did this we would see our membership increase instead of stagnate, or worse still decline.

I would like to see all clubs appoint a member care person on their membership committee, if they don't already have one, to make the phone calls and let their clubs know what is happening with members who may have missed a couple of meetings. You could be pleasantly surprised at the

change in attitude toward your club by your members.



# Lions Eye Health Program

Empowering communities to save sight

## Diabetic Retinopathy – Is someone you know at risk?

Diabetic retinopathy is a complication of diabetes mellitus that damages blood vessels inside the retina at the back of the eye. It commonly affects both eyes and can lead to **vision loss** if it is not treated.

People with diabetes mellitus (Type 1 and Type 2) have a higher prevalence for developing diabetic retinopathy.

Only half of the people with diabetes have a regular eye examination, and one-third have never been checked.

People with diabetes have a 25 times increased risk of vision loss over non-diabetics.

There are no early – stage symptoms of diabetic retinopathy. Vision loss may not occur until the disease is advanced. Latestage diabetic retinopathy symptoms include: blurred vision, eye strain and headaches.

Effective management of diabetes mellitus, including better control of blood sugar levels, blood pressure and cholesterol, will help delay the development of retinopathy.




The National winner of the 2011-2012 Peace Poster


is being introduced to an increasing number of countries. I don't believe that we understand and appreciate that this is an excellent programme that can easily be slotted into schools throughout Tasmania.

by Dorothea Mackellar (1885 – 1968)

Of ordered woods and gardens

Strong love of grey-blue distance
Brown streams and soft dim skies
I know but cannot share it,
My love is otherwise.

I love a sunburnt country,
A land of sweeping plains,

I love her far horizons,
I love her jewel-sea,
Her beauty and her terror The wide brown land for me!

A stark white ring-barked forest All tragic to the moon, The sapphire-misted mountains, The hot gold hush of noon. Green tangle of the brushes, Where lithe lianas coil, And orchids deck the tree-tops And ferns the warm dark soil.

# THIS MONTH IN HISTORY.

- February 1, 1992: 1 and 2 CENT pieces ceased to become available in Australia.
- February 3, 1954: QUEEN ELIZABETH II arrived in Australia and became the first reigning monarch to visit this country.
- February 6, 1906: World's first SURF LIFE SAVING CLUB - Bondi Surf Bather's Life Saving Club was founded in Sydney.
- February 7, 1947: DEAD SEA SCROLLS (dated 150BC-AD68) were discovered in caves, west of Jordan. The texts are of great religious and historical significance, as they are practically the only known surviving Biblical documents written before 100 AD.
- February 8, 1833: A Sydney newspaper announced a ban on SWIMMING during daylight hours.
- February 9, 1895: The word "COBBER" appeared for the first time in The Bulletin.
- February 10, 1993: **FRED HOLLOWS**, NZ born eye surgeon, died aged 64 of cancer.
- February 11, 1978: CHINA lifted its ban on the works of Aristotle, Shakespeare & Dickens.
- February 12, 1851: AUSTRALIA's GOLD RUSH began when Edward Hargreaves discovered gold at Summerhill Creek in NSW.
- February 14, 2005: YOUTUBE.COM domain name was registered.
- February 15, 1932: 2CH celebrates its 80th birthday. It was the NSW Council of Churches that secured the first license (hence'CH' for churches.) It was sold to John Singleton in April 1994. However the Council continues to have a significant input in the format of the station. Sister station to 2GB.
- February 16, 600AD: POPE GREGORY I decreed that "God Bless You" was the correct response to a sneeze.
- February 18, 1954: SKYLINE CINEMA, Australia's first drive-in, opened in Burwood, Melbourne. It closed in 1983.
- February 19, 1942: **DARWIN** was bombed by Japanese aircraft, killing 243 people.
- February 20, 1981: At the AZARIA CHAMBERLAIN inquest in Alice Springs, the coroner Denis Barritt declared in his findings that the baby Azaria has been taken away by a dingo.
- February 22, 2003: Australian cricketer SHANE WARNE was banned from playing cricket until February 2004 when he was found guilty of taking a diuretic (fluid tablet).
- February 23, 1974: POST OFFICES closed for Saturday morning business. Regular Saturday mail deliveries also ceased on this day
- February 25, 1961: TRAMS ran in Sydney for the last time (from La Perouse to Randwick).
- February 28, 1961: MARK LATHAM was born in Sydney, NSW.



# Lions Clubs International FOUNDATION

Dear Lion,

In the time it takes you to read this message, a child will die from a measles related complication. In the following 24 hour period, 450 more children will die. More than 13,000 children will die by months' end. My fellow Lions, we cannot stand by and do nothing.

I am reminded of Helen Keller's words:



"I am only one, but still I am one. I cannot do everything, but still I can do something; and because I cannot do everything, I will not refuse to do something that I can do." The most effective way to help is by making a gift to the One Shot, One Life: Lions Measles Initiative effort. I have already made a commitment, along with International President Tam and the other officers.

Lions, we can and must do something to help these children. We have made great strides against measles in Ethiopia, Madagascar, Mali and Nigeria, and have started work in India. I recently visited the Democratic Republic of Congo, meeting with Lions' African leaders and hearing the desperate call for support of this initiative within their country and their community.

Following the All-Africa conference, I visited Nepal, where the One Shot, One Life: Lions Measles Initiative has expanded. There, we are working to vaccinate and save 10 million children from contracting measles.

Representatives from the World Health Organization, UNICEF and Nepal's Ministry of Health all expressed their gratitude for our help saving the lives of children in Nepal.

When I met with President Ram Baran Yadav of Nepal, he told me that "this is very necessary work; health and social services are neglected areas in my country and we are happy to have your help."

This is great work, but we need to do more. As our efforts expand, Lions have the opportunity to help children in all countries where measles remains a heavy public health burden. For less than US\$1, we can vaccinate one child for life. Through our collaboration with Measles Initiative partners, we can save 157 million children this year!

The Gates Foundation is challenging Lions to mobilize US\$10 million by providing a

matching grant of US\$1 for every US\$2 raised by Lions. LCIF has received several large donations to help meet this challenge, including US\$250,000 from Multiple District 300, Taiwan, and US\$10,000 from International Director Seiki Yamaura from Japan.

With these generous gifts and other donations, we have raised just over US\$810,000 in donations towards meeting our goal of US\$10 million. All Lions are encouraged to support this program and help meet the challenge.

Donations are eligible for Melvin Jones Fellowship recognition and qualifying clubs will receive banner patches based on a per member average.

You can help us save the lives of these children and ensure they do not become a statistic. Be a part of the solution through the One Shot, One Life: Lions Measles Initiative.


Brooks Possums Club for the intellectually Challenged Adults.


