

From the District Governor's Pen...

Fellow Lions

With only two months left in this Lions year it is time for Presidents to reflect on their year to date and see if they you achieved all you set out to ten months ago.

There is still time to polish off your year and make it one of the most memorable in your lives. Don't forget that there are numerous awards available for you to present to worthy members who have gone out of their way to assist those less fortunate than themselves.

Whether it be a Melvin Jones Fellowship, James D Richardson Award or Tasmanian Lions Foundation Fellowship, they are all well received by the recipient and also give much needed donations to our Foundations to carry on the work around this vast world we live in.

I would like to take this opportunity to congratulate all incoming officers following club elections that have recently been conducted. Especially to those who have taken on an executive role within their club. It may seem a daunting task but the roles are not that difficult provided that you prepare yourself for the year ahead.

The District will be running numerous training sessions around the state and we urge you to attend. Even if you have held a position more than once before, Lions International are always changing the procedures and the only way to stay on top of these is to attend training.

I have just heard news from International office that the WMMR procedure will change next year so all Club secretaries will need updating on these changes. It has been disappointing for our Cabinet Secretary this year that some clubs still refuse to do any reporting to L.C.I. This makes it very difficult for all District Officers to do their job properly when they don't know what is happening within the clubs of the District.

I also urge all Membership Chairman to attend at least one Incoming Officers training session. This role is growing within the club structure and I have been able to see first hand as I travel around clubs the importance of having a good, hardworking, Membership Chair. As I have said in the past, if we are to remain a viable District we need to not only increase our membership, but also look after what we already have.

Too often we hear of disgruntled members leaving clubs because their needs were not met. It is up to the clubs Membership team to find out what is causing their members unhappiness within their clubs. We also need to look after our older members and those suffering from illness either to themselves or within their family. We need to give these members a little assistance in appreciation of the work that they have or will do for their club and community.

I recently heard a story that often rings true within our own clubs. A Lions Club member recently lost her husband, also a Lion. Due to the grief she was understandably experiencing, she had not attended her local Lions meeting for a couple of months. Her club didn't contact her once to offer assistance or just to find out how she was travelling. She was both surprised and upset when she received a letter informing her that her club had terminated her membership due to non attendance.

Thankfully another Lions Club nearby heard of this and invited her to join them, which she did and has continued to do some terrific work for her new club and community.

What would your club do if fronted with this issue. I sincerely hope that you contact and support all members who have missed a meeting or two. I also hope you send all members, especially those who are not attending meetings, a copy of the minutes of those meetings so they know what is happening.

I know of at least one Tasmanian Lions Club that assisted one of their members who had suffered the loss of a partner. It doesn't take much effort, we do it with other members of our community, so why not do it to our own club members. If you are seen to be treating your members as part of your family I am sure others will be looking to join your club.



The Lions Clubs of Huon and Port Cygnet have worked together in this project and the result was terrific.



ANZAC Day goes beyond the anniversary of the landing on Gallipoli in 1915. It is the day we remember all Australians

who served and died in all wars, conflicts, and peacekeeping operations. The spirit of ANZAC, with its human qualities of courage, mateship, and sacrifice, continues to have meaning and relevance for our sense of national identity. On ANZAC day, ceremonies are held in towns and cities across the nation to acknowledge the service of our veterans. In Canberra, the Memorial, in close cooperation with RSL ACT, hosts the Dawn Service and the National ANZAC Day Ceremony.

What does ANZAC stand for?

ANZAC stands for Australian and New Zealand Army Corps. The soldiers in those forces quickly became known as ANZACs, and the pride they took in that name endures to this day.

What is ANZAC Day?

ANZAC Day is probably Australia's most important national occasion. It marks the anniversary of the first major military action fought by Australian and New Zealand forces during the First World War.

The 25th of April was officially named ANZAC Day in 1916. It was marked by a wide variety of ceremonies and services in Australia, a march through London, and a sports day in the Australian camp in Egypt. In London over 2,000 Australian and New Zealand troops marched through the streets. A London newspaper headline dubbed them "the knights of Gallipoli". Marches were held all over Australia.

Although the Gallipoli campaign failed in its military objectives, the Australian and New Zealand actions during the campaign left us all a powerful legacy. The creation of what became known as the "ANZAC legend" became an important part of the identity of both nations, shaping the ways they viewed both their past and their future.

What does it mean today?

Australians recognise 25 April as an occasion of national remembrance, which takes two forms. Commemorative services are held at dawn – the time of the original landing – across the nation. Later in the day, ex-servicemen and women meet to take part in marches through the major cities and in many smaller centres. Commemorative ceremonies are more formal and are held at war memorials around the country. In these ways, ANZAC Day is a time when Australians reflect on the many different meanings of war.







Take it on a rotation base. With our cakes and puddings we all should be thinking the year round. Remember the winter Solstice and Christmas in July.


I would like all Club Delegates going to the M.D Convention in Perth to vote in favour of Fudge being a permanent product of our Lions Mint program.


The Trustees of the Australian Lions Foundation were very saddened when informed of the passing of

Lion Richard 'Dick' Strickland 1928 - 2012

last month on King Island. On behalf of the Trustees I extend our sincere sympathy to Jan and family.

Lion Dick was the second Tasmanian Lion to be inducted into the Australian Lions Foundation "Hall of Fame" in recognition of his outstanding service to the Lions Club of King Island and the King Island Community.

Lion Dick was a pivotal member of the King Island Lions Club, having joined on March 1969. Dick was presented with an unprecedented 43 year Perfect Attendance Badge on March 26th 2012.



Readers of the Newsletter in recent months would be aware of my promotion of the autobiography of Lion W.R. "Bill" Tresise M.B.E. He was responsible for establishing the first Lions Clubs in Lismore NSW in 1947.

The book gives a very interesting account of Bill's life and it may be of interest to Tasmanian Lions that he was born in Zeehan, Tasmania and attended the Zeehan State School. But, before establishing Lions Clubs in Australia Lion Bill was very active in Apex Clubs and was a Charter Member of the Apex Club of Lismore.

He became National President of Apex Clubs in Australia and after the War in 1945 represented Australian Apex Clubs at the International Convention held in Sacramento, USA, in 1946. If you would

like to read more of Lion Bill's memoirs then the book is available from me at a cost of \$35.00. Once the cost of publishing this book has been recovered then all the profits will be directed to the Australian Lions Foundation.

At this time of the Lions year Clubs will be preparing for their Changeover Dinners and should any Club require an Australian Lions Foundation Award to recognise outstanding service of a Club member or a member of their community then





Who is & what does the TLF do?

T.L.F. stands for Tasmanian Lions Foundation. It was created in the late 1970's as a way of helping Lions Clubs within the District to get involved in projects that were beyond the resources of a single Club. It is a fundamental part of the Lions organization in this State.

The basic principle is to create a pool of funds from donations by individual Clubs, and then make funds available from the pool to clubs in the form of grants to support worthy projects or to provide disaster relief. Clubs can obtain grants, but must contribute funds to the project. Hence, I believe we should donate to the T.L.F.

As Lions, we are part of the largest voluntary service organization in the world, and this gives us the capacity to be effective not only at our local community level, but on a district, a multiple district & international levels also.

Since our formation the T.L.F. has helped many worthy projects and will continue to do so with your continuing support.

The vessel sleeps 18 (in bunks not hammocks) consisting of 11 Lions and 7 crew and yes we have two toilets and two showers!


Sleeping bag and pillow, towel and toiletries, warm and waterproof clothes (just like bushwalking or camping), your favourite tipple for Saturday night, camera.

Preparation Time: 15 minutes

Ingredients

2/3 tsp bicarbonate of soda

3/4 cup desiccated coconut

2 Tbsp golden syrup

1 cup plain flour

½ cup sugar

Method

Preheat the oven.

Toast the rolled oats by spreading them on a tray and baking in the oven for 8-10 minutes until they have coloured lightly, (optional, a little twist, produces a crisper and crunchier biscuit).

Allow to cool before combining with other ingredients.

Mix the oats, flour, sugar and coconut together.

Melt the syrup and butter together.

Mix the soda and the boiling water together and add to the melted butter and syrup.

Add the mixture to the dry ingredients. Mould spoonfuls of the mixture into

> balls and place onto a bakingpaper covered cookie slide and bake in the oven for 20 minutes.
